LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GHOST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"I have discovered that advertising in The Times reaches further than I suspected," remarked F. C. Birch of the Red Ad Brings Crcas Drug Store, yesterday. "Recently we bought some goods on condition that the manufacturers do some advertising here for it. The goods came but the advertising wasn't ordered for sometime. We didn't have a call for it and the first small ad that was run resulted in eight orders for the goods, four of them being by mail and from Allegany, Gardiner and the Coquille Valley. Each one of the mail orders enclosed a copy of the ad so I know that this sold the goods."

"We are at a loss as to what to do for fresh water for the engines on the long run from San Diego to Panama," remarked C. W. Tuttle, mate of the tug Grayling which stopped here yesterday while en route south from Puget Sound. "We can carry plenty of water for the crew but we will be short on the supply for the engines. However we will strike there about the rainy season and we plan to spread a canvass over the deck so that we can catch all the rainfall and run that in our engine tank. There are few or no places between San Diego and Panama that we can put in at and so we have to adopt unusual means of replenishing the supply. If the rainfall is as heavy as usual there, we won't have any difficulty with our scheme."

"I heard of a peculiar thing today," remarked Geo. N. Bolt yesterday. "It seems that a member of the United States surveying party, which is camped at the fairgrounds while making war maps of Coos Bay, has become enamored with a Marshfield young lady. A couple of days ago, her young brother was at the camp and of course was shown all there was to see by the soldier boy. When it came time for the boy to return home, the soldier wanted to send a novel message to his lady fair and finally hit on the idea of writing it on some army 'hard-tack' that the party had with them. The message was written and the hard-tack carefully wrapped in tissue paper and given to the young brother for delivery to his sister. The boy's curiosity was aroused and en route home he opened the package to see what it was. He found it was hard-tack and then his appetite began to exceed his curiosity. He had heard of hard-tack and was anxious to taste it. He took a nibble and soon the hard-tack was all gone. Weather the message on the hard-tack has been delivered or not, I don't know as the boy has carefully kept his action secret from his sister."
