New Box Factory.—C. Stromer is arranging to put in a box factory on Kentuck Inlet. He has practically completed negotiations for a site and equipment.

Elks to Meet.—Local Elks will meet at the Chamber of Commerce next Monday night to arrange the state for the first officers of the Marshfield B. P. O. E. lodge which will be installed soon.

Auto Breaks Down.—Mr. Allen of Coquille, had troubles of his own with his automobile last evening. About eight miles from here, the machine struck a rut and broke an axle. He had to get a team to get to town.

Bandon Excursion.—A large number of Marshfield people are planning to take advantage of the cheap round trip excursion to Bandon tomorrow and the train which leaves at 8 o'clock promises to carry a good load of excursionists.

Seventy-Eight Burials.—Today marks the close of the fiscal year of the I. O. O. F. Cemetery association. In the past twelve months, seventy-eight have been buried in the cemetery, four more than the previous year. A majority of those buried the past year met with accidental deaths.

Neill Accepts.—John R. Herron, the boxing promoter, today received the following telegram from Al Neill of San Francisco: "Accept match. Weight satisfactory. Send articles with guarantee clause.
