Mrs. G. V. Sharp Driven to Desperation By Child's Incurable Malady.

SALEM, Ohio, June 7.—Mrs. Elizabeth Sharp, a prominent society woman and wife of G. V. Sharp, a politician and manufacturer last night shot and killed her twelve-year-old son, Harold, and then herself. It is supposed the mother was grieving over the incurable nature of the boy's malady. He had been mentally deficient from birth.

her chair and another stool on which she was resting her feet. At the hour the accident occurred, there are few or no calls and it is difficult for the operator to keep awake and she might have momentarily lapsed into a slumber, to be awakened by the fire. However, this is merely a surmise of persons who investigated the matter.

Was Sixteen Years Old.

The dead girl was sixteen years old. She was born in Oklahoma but had resided with her parents in this county for a number of years. Her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. W. F. McDaniel formerly ran a boarding house here and later moved to Bandon. They returned from Bandon to the Bay a few months ago, Mr. McDaniel going to Roseburg on a job and Mrs. McDaniel and her daughter remaining here. Mrs. H. J. Linden of South Marshfield, is a sister of the dead girl.

Mr. McDaniel, the father, is in Roseburg and was notified by long distance phone this morning. He expected to start at once for here. While the arrangements have not been definitely made, it is expected that the funeral will be held tomorrow.

OLD SETTLERS WILL PICNIC

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF SETTLEMENT OF COQUILLE VALLEY WILL BE CELEBRATED THIS FALL.

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., June 7.—A half a century ago, last Saturday the 29th day of May, the first colony of settlers landed in the Coquille valley and made preparations to make this their home. There were forty-five members in the colony and the majority of them have made this beautiful valley their home during all the years that followed. The colony came from Baltimore, Maryland, and was headed by Dr. Hermann, who homesteaded on the South Fork where T. M. Hermann now resides. It is now planned to celebrate this half century anniversary this fall with an old settlers picnic at the Hermann homestead, with a program to extend over several days. The plans for the celebration are yet incomplete, but it is proposed to make it an occasion that will long be remembered. Many of the members of the colony have passed away, but a number survive and they and their descendants are enjoying the opportunities that were discerned by the wise ones who first chose this as an ideal home place. Among those of the original colony who survive are James Burke, Alex Stauff, August Schroeder, Fred Schroeder, T. M. Hermann, Blinger Hermann and Mrs. E. Bender.
