LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"The open season for the shooting of buck deer in Coos county, commences August 1 and ends November 1 of each year," re-Changes In marked J. W. Bennett yesterday. It is un'awful to kill female deer at any time.

It is unlawful to shoot ducks in Coos county, at any time between the 15th of March and the 15th day of September of any year. By section 18 of the Act of the last legislature, it is also unlawful at any time to use any sink box, sinkboat, sneakboat, skiff, steam or gasoline boat or other boats on Coos Bay or its tributaries for the purpose of shooting wild ducks, etc. and the same section provides that it shall be unlawful at any time to use any sinkboat, sneakboat skiff, steam or gasoline boat for the purpose of shooting wild ducks, geese or other water fowls therefrom."
