The Marshfield public schools
closed today for the summer vaca-
tion and not until September 20 will
the school bell interfere with play,
fishing or swimming again. The
closing of the schools was devoid of
ceremony, the high school commen-
cement exercises having been called
off.

The banquet and reception which
the Eighth Grade pupils were plan-
ning to hold at the Odd Fellows hall
this evening, was also called off to-
day.

Tomorrow, the high school pupils
will unite in a picnic at Cutlip's
grove on Coos River.
