LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-
SIP GATHERED HERE AND
THERE ABOUT THINGS OF
PASSING INTEREST.

"Mrs. Rose Coursen-Reed's wit is as keen and clever as her voice is sweet," remarked Capt. Magenn of the Breakwater, to a A Roland Times' reporter. "On For the trip down we had An Oliver. some interesting conversation and I read her some of my poems, including my latest one, 'Julius Caesar.' I also complimented her on her fame as a singer and her talent as a vocalist. 'Capt.," she replied, 'my talent dies with me but yours as a poet lives on forever.'"

"One of the conspicuous features on the grounds of the Seattle Fair," remarked a traveling man today, "is a bronze statue of a James J. Hill, the railway magnate. The statue is of heroic size and is set upon a granite pedestal. At the close of the exposition it will be placed permanently on the campus of the state university. Finn Haakon Frolich is the sculptor. The statue has been paid for by popular subscription and is a tribute from the people of the northwest to the genius of Mr. Hill in the construction of the Great Northern railroad."

"The shillalah owes its name to the fact that the finest specimens thereof used to be grown in the pleasant groves of the Irish trees that formerly flourished in the barony of Shillalah, in County Wicklow," remarked a native of the Emerald Isle to a Times' reporter in answer to a query. "The best shillalah must be a root sprung sapling, for one taken from the branches of a full grown tree would lack the necessary toughness. Being trimmed and 'brought to hand,' the young stick undergoes preparatory discipline by being placed in the chimney to season, thus becoming early acclimatized to the hot work in store for it. This part of the curriculum finished, it is rubbed until completely saturated with oil, after which it is securely wrapped in a stout sheet of brown paper and buried in a convenient hotbed. At this stage of its development it is an object of unceasing watchfulness on the part of its proprietor, who to forestall any detrimental warp in the object of his care visits it daily, correcting any youthful tendency to depart from a straight line and ultimately securing as straight a bit of timber as heart could desire."
