Gets Fine Launch.—D. O. Wolcott has just launched a new twenty-six foot cabin cruiser which will be one of the finest pleasure launches on the Bay. She will be fitted up

with a twelve-horse power engine. The craft is of a late eastern model that has proven very popular in the east.

Brings In Cement.—The Wilhelmina arrived in this morning from Gardiner with the first cargo of the cement that was stored along the Umpqua when E. H. Harriman thought he was building the Drain line. The cement will be reshipped from here to San Francisco on the M. F. Plant.

May Change Shipping.—It is stated upon good authority that the Smith Lumber Company of Marshfield, will in the near future make a change in the routing of their shipments of lumber to the east, and that in future they will ship via Portland instead of San Francisco. Coquille Sentinel.
