Each was about a foot long and each contained over fifty fully developed and matured gooseberries. Mr. Neathery will preserve one branch in alcohol. They were grown at the berry ranch of Bert Seal northwest of town.

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.

News of Upper Valley As Told By The Enterprise.

A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Ramsey at their home in Myrtle Point on Sunday, June 6th.

C. L. Nell and family, who have been making their home at Harney City in southeastern Oregon, returned to Coos county this week to again take up their residence here. Mrs. Nell is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Strong.

S. S. Reed has some exceedingly prolific gooseberry bushes on his ranch. He brought to this office this week a small branch probably ten inches long with several side branches that held fully a pint of fruit. He expects to propagate the bushes to some extent.

J. H. Oerding is establishing a bowling alley in the Hermann building on First street, in the room formerly used as a skating rink. The material for the bowling alley, which is strictly high grade and up-to-date, was shipped in from Michigan, the freight bill on the shipment amounting to nearly \$200.

Frank Harnish of Gravel Ford came in the first of the week with a fine bunch of registered Jersey dairy cattle which will be added to his herd. He secured the stock from a well-known cattle breeder at Salem. The animals are beauties and will in time add their quota to the fame of Coos county as a dairy section.

The road leading out past the cemetery is being considerably improved, and will be in good condition for summer travel and may be kept in good condition for the winter by a day or two of work now and then. A new grade is being established immediately beyond the cemetery which will greatly benefit the road.

Ira Ross, who was down from Rural this week, is one of the lessees of the Morris mining claim. They put in some development work last winter and secured samples assaying \$17.35 in coarse gold at the Seattle office. They are putting in the summer at raising garden, putting up buildings and doing other improvement work and expect to develop the mining proposition further the coming winter.

G. F. Folsom has an acre and a quarter of onions on his place across the river from which he expects to realize \$800. His figures are based on his experience with that crop last season. Then he had a quarter of an acre of ground devoted to onions and cleaned up \$200 from the crop. It is a matter of simple arithmetic to figure that four and a quarter times \$200 should easily be \$800. His crop is coming along nicely.

Road Supervisor Weekly is advancing work on the new road leading through the Arneson place and to the Cooper bridge, and the road is now in condition for use a considerable of the distance. It is expected to have the new road in condition for travel by the time the winter rains begin. When the Cooper bridge is reached what is said to be the best body of rock in the county for road and concrete work will be available for use, one side of the river having a high bluff of flinty rock that will be valuable for improvements that require hard rock.

MAD BULL CLIMBS A HAYLOFT AFTER SHAKER SISTER IN RED

PITTSBURG, Mass., June 12.—Inflamed by a long red coat worn by one of the Shaker sisters at west Pittsfield, a bull jumped the barnyard fence and chased her into the house. It then ran into the barn and up a stairway to a hay loft, putting three men to flight. Peter Volin was terribly mauled by the animal after he had driven a pitchfork into its nose.

Attracted by the noise of the fray, Willie Volin, 13 years old, appeared on the scene with a revolver. Standing on the ladder only six feet away from the brute, the boy sent a bullet into its brain, the bull rolling over dead.
