## WARRANT OUT FOR J. ROGERS

North Bend Man Accused of Carrying Concealed Weapons.

Considerable of the mystery and secrecy surrounding the shooting affair at North Bend Monday night was eliminated today by Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljevist filing a warrant in Justice Shuster's court charging John Rogers with carrying concealed weapons. Mr. Liljevist also exonerates Wm. Montgomery from any blame.

According to the facts as nearly as can be gathered by the officials, John Rogers and his wife, Belle Rogers, have been living apart for sometime. Monday night, Mr. Rogers went to her apartments and tried to gain entrance. She refused and Rogers is alleged to have made threats. It resulted in her leaving her rooms by a back entrance. Mr. Rogers began a search for her. Mrs. Rogers was greatly frightened and finally appealed to Wm. Montgomery who rooms in another part of the flat in which her apartments are located. He finally let her into his room and Mr. Rogers saw her enter. He then, it is alleged, tried to break in the door and finally shot through it with a revolver. He then went around to a window of Mr. Montgomery's room and fired through it. Meanwhile Mr. Montgomery secured a revolver and fired at Rogers, striking the latter in the arm, inflicting only a flesh wound. Rogers is a bartender at the Union saloon.

### RULERS WILL MEET.

Czar and Emperor William Hold Conference.

(By Associated Press.) ST. PETERSBURG, June 25. — Premier Stolypin, Foreign Minister Iswolsky, Count Von Pourtales, the German ambassador, and German military and naval attaches left here today on board the Russian Imperial Yacht Polar Star to join Emperor Nicholas on the south coast of Finland where a meeting between Emperor Nicholas and Emperor William of Germany, will take place tomorrow.

### WANT CHINESE LOAN.

American Bankers After Part of Railway Bond Issue.

(By Associated Press.) PEKIN, China, June 16.—Acting on the request, Henry P. Fletcher, the charge d'affaires of the American legation in China has not agreed to ratify the foreign loan of \$27,500,000 from British, Germany and French bankers for the construction of the Hankow-Sze-Chuen Railroad. It is expected this refusal will result in arrangements being made for Americans to participate in the loan.

### VESSELS NOT TO BLAME.

Mysterious Crafts in Venezuelan Waters Not Flibustering.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, D. C., June 16.—The state department's official advice of Venezuela today cleared up the mysterious steamer Nantleoke and the tug Dispatch, suspected of filibustering, showing they were harassed by Venezuela. Observation of the vessels has been abandoned and the agents have returned to Washington.

### FOR CORPORATION TAX.

President Taft Confers About Special Message to Congress.
