legitimate public service corporations can treat with you on proper business lines. In case of street railways or railroads we have provided that the majority of the abutting property owners along the entire project of any proposed system, shall first assent thereto. This plan seemed to meet with the approval of a large number of property owners of the city and while there was much in favor of submitting such matters to popular vote rather than leave it in the manner we have presented it, yet taking everything into consideration, which presented itself to us, we conclude that property owners are vitally interested in the progress and welfare of the city and no meritorious franchise would likely be lost through any unreasonable conduct on their part. It remains with the council to see that all franchises, grants, rights and privileges contain the proper provisions for the safe guarding of the public's interest and reposing special confidence in the ability and good judgment of the persons who fill the offices of mayor and councilmen to meet individual request for franchises upon their particular merits, we have provided such general powers which will enable you to treat with franchises in a manner that best suits the requirements of the public at the particular time which they are sought. The chapter we have submitted on finance, revenue and taxation will meet the requirements necessary to provide for funds to protect the credit of the city and to secure any existing indebtedness. We have made a provision for the annual payment of interest on warrants that have been protested by the treasurer which will remove the objections to the present warrant indebtedness and make them desirable securities for investors; if this feature is adopted, it is possible, that a bonded indebtedness to secure the existing indebtedness will not be necessary unless it is for the purpose of reducing the rate of interest.

honored owing to lack of funds, it is now up to the council to arrange to get funds if they want to purchase it. Owing to the mixup in the matter, it was decided to take the matter up at a special meeting this evening.

Other Business.

S. B. Cathcart, Tom Nicols and J. Albert Matson presented their report as viewers to fix the assessments for the construction of the South Marshfield sewage system. The report was adopted.

The matter of fixing the grade for Market avenue was brought up again last night. A. H. Stutsman objected to the present plan which will make a cut of thirty-four feet along his property. He favored a divided street approaching the hill, the same as at the west end of Central avenue. The matter was referred to the street committee to investigate.

Planagan avenue between Tenth street and Twelfth Court was ordered graded. The property owners along the balance of the street are having it improved on a private contract.

Contractors Want Money.

J. D. Goss, representing various contractors who have done work for the city during the past year, last night urged the council to take steps to clean up these bills. He said that if it was impossible to raise the cash for the contractors now, arrangements should be made to pay them six per cent interest on the balance due them. He said that the unpaid claims of contractors against the city amounted to about \$25,000 and that considerable of the work had been completed several months ago. He said the contractors had figured on getting cash for their work when it was completed and some had borrowed money at eight per cent to defray some of their expenses.

City Attorney Snover said that he did not think there was any legal way the contractors could be paid interest. In this connection, Mr. Snover urged that on future work, the city collect all the assessments before the work is started. He said that this would insure the prompt payment of the contractors and that in turn they would take the jobs for less. For instance, he said that last year the city had to pay thirty-two cents or so per cubic yard for grading while this spring private individuals are getting their grading done for twenty-one cents because they will pay promptly.

Councilman Coke said that in view of Attorney Snover's remarks, he did not think the contractors were entitled to so much sympathy as long as they were merely experiencing one of the losses for which they had allowed in submitting their bid.

However, Mr. Coke and the other members of the council stated that they hoped to get these claims cleared up as soon as the new charter is adopted and the city placed on a better financial basis.

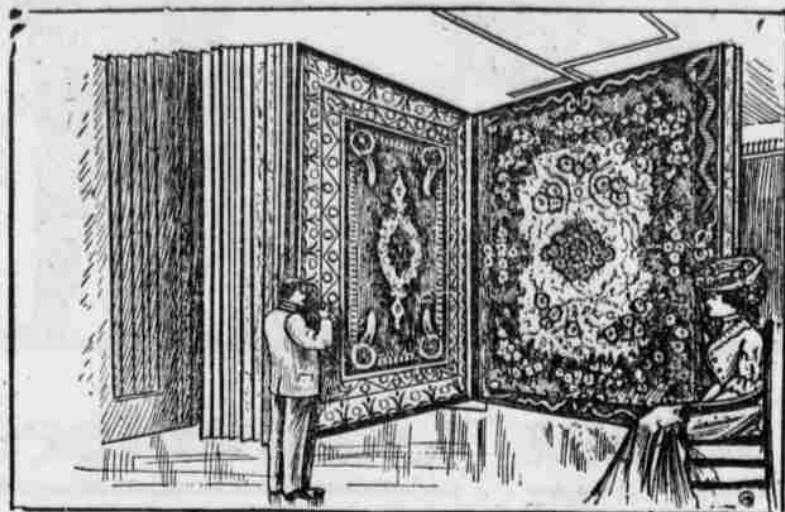
