NO FREE MAIL DELIVERY NOW

INSPECTOR MORSE SAYS ROADS MUST BE PUT IN SHAPE TO INSURE REGULAR ARRIVAL FIRST.

S. H. Morse, a postoffice inspector, is in Marshfield to investigate the feasibility of establishing free mail delivery here. Judging from his remarks this morning, Marshfield cannot hope to secure free delivery of mail until the mail service here at all times in the year is made regular.

"Tell me how it would be possible to arrange for free mail delivery in Marshfield in the face of those figures," said Mr. Morse today as he pushed over a record of the arrival time of the mail during the month of January, last. As everyone knows, the hour of arrival varied from early morning until late at night and some days the mail did not arrive at all. "I don't believe anyone wants the government to employ two or three mail carriers who, under the circumstances shown in that report, would have nothing to do for nine hours but to make wagers with each other as to the time the mail would get in, so they could go to work or whether it would arrive at all."

"I am simply going to send the department the reports showing the hour of arrival of the mail during the present year and see if the department can solve it."

Mr. Morse said that he came in over the Coos Bay wagon road, reaching here early in the morning. It was his second or third trip and declares positively he will never ride over it again. He said that he was twenty-two hours on the road, had to walk a good share of the distance and was drenching wet most of the time.

"It is simply up to the people here now to provide for better mail service," said Mr. Morse. "No one can give good mail service until the roads are put in good condition and kept up. They are in awful shape now."

"The judge of the Douglas county court told me that they would not spend any money on the Douglas county end of the Coos Bay wagon road. Last year, they spent \$25 and they have appropriated \$225 for this year. However, they informed me that Douglas county would assist in keeping up one road to Coos county if Coos county would centralize its efforts on either of the two roads. Now with this condition, it seems to me the two counties ought to get together. As Douglas county is averse to improving the Coos Bay wagon road, then get together on the Coquille road. About twenty miles on the Roseburg end of it is in good shape now and the Coos end of it is good as far as Remote, leaving only about twenty miles of road over which it will be necessary to pack the mail during the winter months."

"With this done, I am sure the postoffice department would make a special contract with the local railway for mail service between Myrtle Point and Coos Bay, thus insuring the regular arrival of mail here. With this, arrangement can be made for free delivery service in Marshfield."

"I have at several times criticised the roads in this section and some have dubbed me a 'knocker' for doing so. However, I have merely told the plain, candid truth and any one who goes over the road can verify it."

"It is simply up to the people of this section to get together and fix up roads that it is possible to give the service over and the department will see that the service is given then."
