Will Celebrate.—Ten Mile residents are arranging for an old fashioned Fourth of July celebration at Lakeside Saturday, July 3.

Ball Tonight.—The Alumni ball will be held at the Odd Fellows hall this evening. There promises to be an unusually large attendance.

Smith Coming.—Word has been received here that Elijah Smith will return to Coos Bay about July 1 to look after Southern Oregon Company property.

Social Entertainment.—The Ladies Aid Society of the Lutheran church, are making arrangements for a social to be held in the church tomorrow evening.

Child Dies.—Bernard Anderson, the two-year-old son of Jacob Anderson, died yesterday at their home in West Marshfield after a prolonged illness. The funeral will be held tomorrow.

Arm Is Broken.—According to press dispatches, E. H. Raymond of Marshfield, sustained a broken arm while participating in the celebration of the arrival of a railroad at Klamath Falls.

Saw Eclipse.—Between 4:30 and 5:00 yesterday afternoon, a partial eclipse of the sun was visible on Coos Bay. It was difficult to see it with the naked eye. The eclipse was about one-tenth.

Moves Into New House.—The Rev. Father J. Moran has moved into the

parsonage of St. Monica's Catholic church, just south of the edifice. It has been remodeled and overhauled for his occupancy.

Bakery to Move.—The City Bakery has leased the quarters on Broadway, directly across the street from The Times' office and will move there within a few days from Market avenue where it is now located. Manager Hunter has had the new quarters overhauled and it will be one of the neatest little bakeries imaginable. The new location will make it more convenient for his trade.

Ready For Fourth.—Last night, the city council granted the Marshfield Fire Department the usual privileges for conducting the Fourth of July celebration. They were also given permission to erect a couple of shacks on North Front street to be burned in giving a demonstration of fire fighting in the evening. Provision was made for extra night watchmen and special police during the Fourth of July period.

Move Offices.—John D. Goss is moving his law office in the First Trust & Savings Bank building from present quarters to the suite of offices adjoining those of Dr. Mingus in the same building. Judge John S. Coke is moving his office into the one formerly occupied by J. M. Blake. C. R. Peck, who has purchased Judge Coke's library and J. V. Adjourn to Tuesday.—The city council last evening adjourned until next Tuesday evening when the charter will be taken up again. The council has gone over about one-half of the document. Owing to the length of time it may require to get it ready to submit to a special election, some of the councilmen are talking of calling a special election to submit the bond question. They point out that the financial condition of the city should be straightened out at once.
