DETAILED REPORT OF DREDGE OREGON'S OPERATIONS ON COOS BAY IS MADE

A detailed report of the work of the dredge Oregon on Coos Bay has been submitted to the Chamber of Commerce by the special dredge committee consisting of J. E. Oren, C. J. Millis and Dr. E. Mingus. The report covers the time the dredge was operating on private funds. On June 1, the dredge committee turned the dredge over to Coos Bay Port Commission. Everyone is familiar with the great work the dredge has accomplished under the direction of Capt. Peters and consequently the report of the financial phases of the operation will be of interest. The dredge is gradually clearing the channel down the bay and filling in the mud flat on the west side of the channel. The low section of North Bend will be filled in this way. The dredge is now operating on the government fund secured by the transfer of the balance left in the jetty fund.

The dredge committee is entitled largely to the credit for keeping the dredge Oregon on Coos Bay until it was possible to secure the government fund. Dr. Mingus, C. J. Millis and J. E. Oren have labored without pay and they are deserving of great thanks from Marshfield and Coos Bay generally for the excellent service they have rendered.

The work of the dredge shows a profit and will enable the declaring of a refund of about twenty per cent to the original contributors to the fund to bring the dredge here. Some of the contributors took filling sufficient to reimburse them. This refund will be declared as soon as the accounts are collected. Besides this refund, the Chamber of Commerce was reimbursed for about \$1,500 it expended.

The report is as follows:
To the executive committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce,

Gentlemen:—
We, your committee, appointed to provide funds for the operation of the dredge "Oregon" in the Coos Bay channel have the honor to submit herewith our report of receipts and disbursements, together with the cash balance on hand and balances still due on contract for filling. Upon approval of our report, we ask to be discharged and relieved from further duty in connection therewith.

Our cash balance in the banks is \$990.10 and we hand you with this report our check on the First National Bank for \$987.86 and on Flanagan & Bennett Bank for \$2.24.

We turn over to you two notes given by Ezra A. Maiz amounting to \$56.00 in favor of Flanagan & Bennett Bank, payable six months and one year after date for filling furnished upon his lots.

We furnish you herewith the amounts still due and payable on contracts, which should be presented for collection.

We desire to thank the Chamber of Commerce for the support it has given us in carrying out this successful undertaking, and the great good which has been accomplished in such an economical manner has received the grateful recognition of those who have been benefitted.
