NEWS OF BANDON.

Happenings of City-By-the-Sea
Taken From the Recorder.

The new \$30,000 school building
was formally dedicated with an ap-
propriate program Friday, June 18.

Rev. Geo. H. Roach returned last
Friday from Denver, Colorado,
where he has been in attendance at
the General Assembly of the Presby-
terian Church as a commissioner
from the Southern Oregon Presby-
tery.

Next Monday, June 21st will be
the annual school election for dis-
trict No. 54, comprising Bandon and
vicinity. There will be two mem-
bers of the board to elect, one to
fill the place of C. I. Kime, resigned
and moved to Myrtle Point and one
to fill the place of Geo. P. Topping
whose term expires. Mr. Topping
will no doubt be elected to succeed
himself.

Joseph Walser one of the pioneers
of Coos county died at the hospital
in San Francisco, Sunday, June 13,
1909, being 73 years, 6 months and
16 days. Mr. Walser was born in
Zirli Tyrol, Austria, Nov. 27, 1835.
He arrived in Coos county, Oregon,
October 15, 1881, coming on the
steamer Arcadia and settled at Co-
quille. He went to California in
1891 and came back to Coos county
in 1895. His wife's maiden name
was Rosina Hocheder, born in Zeil,
Zillerthal, Tyrol Austria, in 1858.
Six children were born to them.
William, the oldest, was born in
Salt Lake City in 1881, and died
when yet young; Sophia now Mrs.
Simpson; Alias, Flora, Otto and
Rosina, the latter of whom died
about three years ago in San Fran-
cisco. Mr. Walser served two wars
as a soldier in the Austrian army;
one in 1859 against Italy and
France, and again in 1866 against
Italians. He came to America in
1870. The remains were brought up
on the Fifield and after a short fu-
neral service at the home will be
interred in the Bandon cemetery.

CANDIDATES ARE NAMED.

**Ticket Put In Field For Bandon
Municipal Election.**

BANDON, Ore., June 19.—There
were about 125 men present at the
city mass meeting Tuesday night to
nominate candidates for city officers.
The first thing on the program was
the nomination of candidates for
mayor. The names of Steve Gal-
lier, L. J. Radley, J. C. Shields and
J. T. Mars were placed in nomina-
tion for mayor. Gallier received 87
votes, Radley 21, Shields 10, Mars
2 and A. McNair 1.

For councilmen there were many
names placed in nomination but
they almost as rapidly declined,
leaving only about ten or eleven
candidates, they are: H. Manciet,
Mr. Windsor, G. Boak, Harry Mor-
rison, W. F. Disher, Nels Rasmus-
sen, M. Breuer, H. C. Ostien, E.
Lewin, J. W. Mast.

For municipal judge, Geo. P.
Topping was unanimously nominated
by acclamation as was also C. R.
Wade for city recorder.

"I thank my friends and voters
of Bandon for nominating me for
councilman and will thank them still
further if they do not vote for me
for if elected I positively decline to
serve." E. Lewin.

IS KILLED BY TREE.

**Former Coos County Man Victim of
Accident.**

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says:
"A brief message was received here
yesterday morning bringing the dis-
tressing news that J. C. Royer had
been killed by a tree falling on him.
Mr. Royer and family had moved to
Lane county, near Marcola, about a
month ago, and was engaged in
clearing up a piece of land which
he had recently purchased. His pa-
rents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Royer,
had accompanied him to his new
home. The message was received by
Daniel Barklow, who was re-
quested to break the news to Mrs.
Royer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thom-
as Barklow, and other relatives and
friends. In accordance with the
request of the message, Mr. and
Mrs. Thos. Barklow expected to
leave for Marcola yesterday. Be-
sides the parents Mr. Royer is sur-
vived by a wife and eleven children
and his death is particularly unfor-
tunate."

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.

**News of Upper Coquille Told By The
Enterprise.**

Cashier L. M. Suplee of the Flana-
gan & Bennett Bank of Myrtle Point,
left the first of the week for Dou-
glas county where he will enjoy a
few weeks of rest and recreation. J.
W. Leneve of Coquille, is attending
to the business of the bank during
his absence.

It is reported that the McBees mill
at Enchanted Prairie was burned one
day last week. It is estimated that
the value of the property was \$1,500
to \$2,000. Besides the loss to the
owners, the people in that district
will be inconvenienced as they de-
pend on the mill for their building
material.

County Judge Hall heard a suit
in probate court Friday and Satur-
day of last week. It is a case in
which Dr. J. D. Wetmore is suing
the Sears estate for fees for medical
attendance on the late Jack Sears.
A number of witnesses were exam-
ined during the two days. Judge Hall
has not yet rendered a decision.

Married on June 7, 1909, by J.
M. Arnston, justice of the peace and
judge of the police court at Tacoma,
Wash., Mr. Henry A. Russell of
Kendrick, Idaho, and Miss Minnie
Whittington of Myrtle Point. Mr.
Russell is the elder brother of the
late S. S. Russell, state senator from
Garfield county, Wash., and is a
prominent fruit grower and fine
stock raiser of the Potlatch country,
Idaho, the present home of several
former Coos county citizens. Miss
Whittington, who spent the past
year with relatives and friends in
the Potlatch country and who at the
time of her marriage was visiting
her sister and friends in Tacoma, is
the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W.
Whittington of the South Fork.

The permanent work that has
been put on the road between here
and Coquille is standing the wear
very well and is one of the best
roads in the county, but there are
a few unimproved portions that de-
tract from the general good char-
acter of the highway and should re-
ceive attention. In a couple of
places where the road rounds rocky
cliffs it should be widened as they
are places of danger when meeting
other teams or automobiles, and the
rocking of portions not yet complet-
ed should be undertaken. A mini-
mum of work will then keep the
road in good repair and this can
now be done in the winter time when
men and teams are better obtained
than in the busy summer season.

TROUBLE OVER BONDS.

**Portland Financiers Pick Flaw In
Myrtle Point Issue.**

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., June 19.—
The city council is experiencing
some difficulty in realizing on the
bonds recently authorized in the
sum of \$22,000 for the rebuilding
of the waterworks system. The bid
of a Portland firm was accepted and
they were notified of the action.
They expressed dissatisfaction with
the proceedings of the election fur-
nished them and asked that a new
election be held. Attorney Sperry
of Coquille, who was engaged to at-
tend to the legal aspect of the elec-
tion has been here this week and
states that he finds details of the
proceedings correct. A complete re-
cord of all the transactions of the
elections will be forwarded to the
bonding company and it is believed
that they must be satisfied and fur-
nish the money. Meanwhile the
work of improving the system has
been delayed and it will be late in
the summer before the system can
be installed.

MANY HAVE MEASLES.

**Nine Cases Quarantined at Myrtle
Point.**

Dr. Johnson reports one case of
scarlet fever and nine cases of
measles in town. The measles are
all in three families, or rather in
three sections of one family, the ex-
posure taken place at Roseburg,
where there have been many families
under quarantine. The various fam-
ilies were promptly placed under
strict quarantine and it is believed
that any spread of the contagion in
either case will be avoided.
