**Play at Norway.**—At Norway yesterday, the Norway baseball team defeated the Lee team and Fairview defeated the Cunningham Creek loggers' team. There was a big crowd at the games.

**Many Picnics.**—The fine weather yesterday lured a large number of picnic parties from North Bend and Marshfield to the pleasure grounds around the Bay. Many went to the beach and others up Coos River.

**Improves Residence.**—J. W. Bennett is having extensive improvements made in his residence at the corner of Market avenue and Broadway. The upper story is being changed to afford additional room and also to further improve the appearance of the structure.

**Will Sell Bonds.**—The Siuslaw Port Commission is advertising for bids on a bond issue of \$100,000 to improve the river and harbor. The bids will close July 15. It was gen-

## LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"There is not half as much crime in Oklahoma as is generally supposed, nor one-third as much as there used to be," said a resident of that state

Oklahoma. to a Times' reporter.

"When I first went to Oklahoma years ago there was considerable lawlessness, and in many sections a six shooter was the law. But it is changed now, and we live in peace and comfort with but few outbreaks of lawlessness or deviltry. One would suppose that it keeps the sheriffs and the court officers busy catching and punishing criminals, but it is not so. I venture to say that not as many men have been convicted of serious crimes in our county as in this county the past year."

"There is an increased demand for ladies' cigarettes in Oregon," said a cigar and cigarette salesman. "Not until a few years ago did the company that I represent make a ladies' size cigarette. Since they have been doing it the demand for them has increased at a rate that is alarming to moralists and satisfactory to the company. The cigarette is much smaller and a great deal milder than the men's size, and its attractive appearance is said to have a great deal to do with gaining it favor among the women. Our increased sales is all the ground I have for the assertion that smoking among the women of Oregon is on the increase. There are no visible signs of the weed's growing popularity in the state. In many cities in the east the women smoke cigarettes openly in the cafes, but I have never seen anything of that sort in Oregon. It is possible that they adopt the small boy's tactics and go out behind the wood shed for their after dinner smoke."
