But He Wags Tail to Show No Of-
fense Is Intended.

SACO, Maine, June 22.—Maine
hasn't seen such a sight since it be-
came a prohibition state as Fred
Thim's pig—it barks like a dog and
wags its tail.

That isn't all. The pig has all the
 earmarks of a dog. That is, its
ears are long and drooping like a
hound. And the markings are black
and white.

Mr. Thim, a railroad man of this
city, has had many visitors from all
over the state to see the pig put
through its stunts. Mr. Thim pro-
duces the marks by throwing a stick
for the pig to fetch. The barking
and the frantic run brings a laugh,
but when the pig returns with the
stick and wags its tail the visitors
are convulsed.

Mr. Thim declares the pig grows
at strangers and then just to show
no offense is intended, attempts to
lick their hands. The visitors say
they have an impulse to jump when
the pig barks.

There are twenty-two lepers—half
