**Sail Tomorrow**—The Nann Smith will sail tomorrow for Bay Point. H. E. Quist and J. D. Gray of North Bend, will make the trip down on her.

**Ladies Night**—The Millicoma club is making arrangements for a "Ladies Night" next Tuesday evening. Dancing will be the principal diversion.

**Special Meeting**—A special meeting of Coos Bay Port Commission, is being held this afternoon at the office of the secretary, Henry Sengstacken. The dredging of the channel of the bay is being discussed.

**Empire Election**—At the annual school election in Empire, Monday, John Peterson was elected a director for three years, Chas. E. Getty for two years and Wm. Sanderson for one year. Lee Webster was re-

elected clerk. There were no contests.

**Initiate Many**—The Marshfield Aerie of Eagles is planning a big initiation and celebration this evening. It is expected that between fifty and one hundred will be put through this evening. A number from the Coquille Valley, are expected to attend.

**Made Quick Trip**—The Wilhelmina reached Coos Bay early yesterday after making a new record for the round trip between here and Bandon. She was eight hours and thirty minutes making the trip, unloading her cargo and taking on a cargo at Bandon.

**Lumber Shipments**—Coos County lumber shipments for the month of May are given as follows: Bandon, four cargoes, 1,194,978; Prosper, five cargoes, 1,421,439; Randolph, one cargo, 350,000; North Bend, three cargoes, 1,563,464; Marshfield, nine cargoes, 7,131,545.

**Surveyors Move**—The surveying corps of the United States Artillery which has been working in this section preparing war maps of the country, this morning moved their camp to Sumner. They will remain there a few days and will then work eastward along the old Coos Bay wagon road to Roseburg.

**Home From Mexico**—F. W. Reeder has returned from an extended trip through Arizona, California and Old Mexico. He is greatly pleased with the prospects of the Imperial Valley. While away, he picked up some fishing and hunting yarns that will make the Coos Bay anglers and nimmers turn green with envy.

**Start Paving Soon**—The final contracts for the bituminous rock paving in the down town district are now being signed up and it is hoped to get the work underway within a few weeks. By having the work done by private contract, it is stated it can be started much sooner and probably be done more cheaply than if it is done by a contract with the city.

**Express Appreciation**—At the last meeting of the executive committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, resolutions expressing the appreciation of that body of the faithful and efficient work of Dr. E. Mingus, J. E. Oren and C. J. Mills

as members of the dredge committee. Resolutions of appreciation of the services of Walter Lyon were also adopted.

**Broke Record**—Mrs. A. H. Stutsman made what she claims to be record-breaking time between Coquille and Marshfield by making the trip from that place to this city this morning in one hour and twenty-two minutes in her auto.

**Longest Day**—Yesterday was the longest day in the year, that it is was longer from sunrise to sunset than any other day. In fact it was so long that the employees of the mechanical department of The Times got a day ahead of time and dated last evening's issue June 23 when it should have been June 22. From now on, the days will gradually get shorter until December 22, the shortest day in the year.

**Good Roads**—Dr. Wm. Horsfall made a trip over the Coos Bay wagon road one day this week as far as Laird's and reports it in better condition than ever before at this season of the year. He says the commissioners are doing some excellent work on the road. Much planking is being done in and around Fairview. The fact that Dr. Horsfall made a 70-mile trip leaving Marshfield in the morning and was back in Sumner before 8 p. m. would indicate that the roads were fairly good.

**Divide Gate Receipts**—It has been practically agreed that the teams in the Coos county league will divide the gate receipts of all games instead of each club retaining all the home gate receipts as its share of the earnings. North Bend, Myrtle Point and Coquille favored this but at first Manager Burkhardt of Marshfield, objected to it. The division will be seventy per cent to the home team and thirty to the visitors. Next Sunday, Marshfield will play Myrtle Point at Myrtle Point and North Bend, Coquille at Coquille. An excursion will probably be run from here.

**Rev. Summerlin Returns**—Rev. R. G. Summerlin of North Bend, returned today via Roseburg and Myrtle Point from Philomath, Oregon, where he has been attending the annual conference of the United Brethren church. He was reappointed to the North Bend charge and also made presiding elder of Coos county. Rev. M. H. Starnes of Philomath, was appointed for the Coos River charge and Rev. Mr. Cliney appointed for Gravel Ford and that section. If arrangements can be made to secure a temporary pastor at North Bend, Rev. Mr. Summerlin with a singer who will be sent here by the Conference, will conduct revival services at various points in the county for a couple of months.

**Schubert Is Honored**—H. C. Schubert, for ten years steward on the steamship Alliance, will leave today for Seattle to take a position at steward on the steamer Humboldt on the Puget Sound-Alaska run. Since retiring from the Alliance run sometime ago, Mr. Schubert has spent considerable time on the Bay looking after property interests here. Yesterday he received one of the handsomest letters of recommendation and appreciation from Geo. D. Gray, principal owner of the Alliance, that was ever given an employee. The letter was brought up by Capt. Olson of the Nann Smith, and who was formerly master of the Alliance. Mr. Schubert, familiarly known as "Foxy," is one of the best liked men who has ever run into Coos Bay and the best wishes of a host of friends here will follow him to his new position.
