WILL KEEP CAFFERY.

Mayor Simpson of North Bend Upholds Marshal.

Mayor L. J. Simpson of North Bend, announces that Chief of Police Caffery will be retained as head of the police force there despite the charges made against him by Mr. Daly, the discharged night watchman, and friends of the latter. Mayor Simpson decided that the council had no jurisdiction in the matter. Concerning it, Mr. Simpson made the following statement:

"You can merely state that charges of a criminal nature must be filed against Caffery before I will consider them. Mr. Caffery is an efficient policeman and is carrying out my orders to the letter. I consider him the best man for the position we have ever had. As far as I am concerned the matter is closed and Chief Caffery will be retained."

FIND BOOTY CACHED.

Douglas County Officials Discover Stolen Property.

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 26. — Under a pile of loose rocks, about 60 feet west of the Southern Pacific Railroad tracks, a quarter of a mile south of town, Sheriff Fenton found part of the \$400 worth of loot stolen from McCulloch Brothers store at Halsey, Linn county, on the night of May 16th last. The stuff recovered consists of a Smith and Wesson revolver, two boxes of cartridges, two razors and a quantity of cheap jewelry. Today Sheriff Fenton went to Halsey to search for the remainder of the loot, taking along the articles found in the cache near Roseburg.

Sheriff Fenton's discovery was due to information furnished involuntarily by a prisoner. The most interesting part of the story is the news that the man who committed the burglary of the Halsey store is Ed. Tracey, who last May was sentenced in the circuit court here to three years' imprisonment in the state penitentiary for robbing Wilder & Agee's clothing store in this city.
