HELP OREGON ORCHARDISTS.

Agricultural Department to Show How Fruit Should Be Packed.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 29.—Representative Hawley has received the following letter from the Secretary of Agriculture in response to a recent recommendation on behalf of the shippers of apples, pears, peaches, prunes, grapes and other fruits grown in Oregon:

"Your esteemed favor of the 10th instant is at hand, requesting that a competent man be assigned to Oregon for the purpose of teaching the people of that state how to ship various kinds of perishable fruits. This department is carrying on extensive investigations along this line in different parts of this country and it has been our desire for some time to extend the work in the extreme northwest, but up to this time we have not been able to do so. G. Harold Powell, who is in charge of the fruit transportation and storage investigations, is planning to take a trip to Washington and Oregon during the present summer in order to become acquainted with the problems of this nature that need developing in those states. It is Mr. Powell's intention to visit Oregon on this trip.

"It will not be possible to carry on definite investigations in the northwest during the present summer, but I can assure you that our investigation will be extended to that section just as soon as it can be done."

RAPID CITY'S HOPE REVIVED

SOUTH DAKOTA TOWN EXPECTS COOS BAY LINE WILL SOME DAY REACH THERE — WAS FRED. HAINES' FORMER HOME

The Black Hills Journal, published at Rapid City, S. D., the former home of Chief Engineer Haines recently printed the following:

Fred A. Haines, well-known in Rapid City, has at last got something started on the Coos Bay line of which, if furthered sufficiently, will some day connect Rapid City with the coast. Get a map and follow the line where a road could be built and it will show something interesting. This is the line of road P. B. McCarthy talked about eighteen years ago.

"Mr. Haines who was formerly the locating engineer of the Chicago & North-Western railroad company in Nebraska, South Dakota and Wyoming, has made a proposition to the Coos Bay, Oregon & Idaho railway Company, which was recently organized by the people of Coos Bay, to survey and build a steam railroad between Coos Bay and some point at or near Roseburg, Ore., to have the road completed and in operation in two years from May 15, 1910. The condition exacted by Mr. Haines is that the local company furnish the money to make the survey and acquire the right of way, but he agrees that this is to be repaid to the persons advancing it when those whom he represents take the road over and commences its construction. The people of Coos Bay have accepted the proposition and the banks of Marshfield and North Bend, as well as many of the business men and property owners, have furnished the means to comply with the conditions as to the survey and right of way.

"Mr. Haines and a crew of men, most of whom have worked under him on the North-Western system in the Black Hills and in Wyoming for many years, are already in the field and the work of making the survey is being pushed rapidly. Mr. Haines' backers are unknown, but from his previous connection, it is believed a powerful combination is interested in opening up Central Oregon."

FAST BOAT RACES.

Many Power Boats Entered in Seattle Contests.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 29.—Dozens of trim looking power boats have gathered from all parts of the coast on Lake Washington for the speed races of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition which will begin Saturday, July 3, and will end Saturday, July 10.

Seattle will have probably the most powerful boat in the races. This is the Pacer, which is now housed at the Circle Swing boat house under the care of Eddie Roesch, the owner. The Pacer is equipped with a six-cylinder, 120-horse-power Leighton engine.

Portland has several prominent entries. California will be represented with the "Fighting Bob" of Eureka, which holds the state championship. This boat is a thirty-five footer, Prentiss Gray of San Francisco will enter his Konocli, a forty-footer, which was second to the "Fighting Bob" in the California races.

W. T. Brown, formerly of Buffalo, N. Y., and now a resident of Seattle, has entered a thirty-footer that won the races of the Buffalo Launch Club for two seasons. It is equipped with a forty-horse-power engine. P. G. Hildebrand of Tacoma, will have a fast boat in the twenty-two-foot class.

HILL ARRIVES WITH STRING

WELL-KNOWN SAN FRANCISCO HORSEMEN HERE TO PARTICIPATE IN MARSHFIELD RACES JULY 2, 3, 4 AND 5.

With a couple pacers and one trotter, F. S. S. Hill arrived here from San Francisco yesterday to take part in the race meet which will be pulled off at the Marshfield Fairgrounds July 2, 3, 4 and 5. The arrival of Mr. Hill with his horses insures sufficient entries to make every event closely contested. Mr. Hill is one of the best known horsemen of San Francisco and the animals he brought here are said to be winners. He will start them here after having got them in condition for the northern circuit.

W. W. Cardwell arrived last evening from Roseburg and will back his horses to a finish in the races.

Several strange horses have been brought in the last few days and local followers of the turf are rather puzzled over them. The other day, a couple of the owners of jumpers got into an animated argument over the merits of their animals and it resulted in a half mile race being pulled off for a \$40 bet with just the trainers and owners on the ground as witnesses.

The race was between Hand Maiden, a four-year-old filly and Frederick Rhodes, the owner of Hand Maiden rode her bareback but lost the race.

Hill's horses Berkeley Kid and Almost Princess, pacers, and Billy Murray, a trotter.

The management has fixed the admittance at a low price, fifty cents for Friday and Monday. Saturday and Sunday, the admittance will be seventy-five cents but this includes the baseball games between Marshfield and Coquille and Marshfield and North Bend.

The general program for the races follows:

- First Day—Friday, July 2d. Auto race, burro race, etc. Race No. 1—Running, 5-8 mile dash, purse \$100. Race No. 2—Trotting and pacing, 1/2 mile heats, 2:25 class, best 2 out of 3, purse \$100. Race No. 2 1/2—Burro race, free entrance, half mile, first premium \$2.50, second \$1.50. Race No. 3—Running, 3-8 mile dash, purse \$75. Race No. 4—5 mile automobile race, 10-H. P., \$15 to first, \$10 to second. Second Day Saturday, July 3d. Baseball—Marshfield vs. Coquille. Race No. 5—Running 3-4 mile dash, purse \$150. Race No. 6—Pacing and trotting, half mile heats 2:20 class, best 2 out of 3, purs \$100. Race No. 6 1/2—Burro race, free entrance, half mile dash, purse \$1 \$2.50; second \$1.50. Race No. 7—Running 5-8 mile, owners' handicap, purse \$150. Race No. 8—Running, 1/4-mile dash, owners' handicap, free entrance for horses not trained this season, \$10 first, \$5 second. Sunday, July 4th. Baseball—Marshfield vs. North Bend. Special race for named horses. Free-for-all trot and pace. Free-for-all running races. Third Day—Monday, July 5th. Auto race, etc. Race No. 9—Running, half mile dash, purse \$100. Race No. 10—Trotting and pacing, half mile heats, best 3 out of 5, free for all, purse \$150. Race No. 11—Running, 3-8 mile dash, owners' handicap, free entrance for horses not trained this season, first \$15, 2nd \$10, 3rd \$5. Race No. 12—Running, mile dash, purse \$150.

As a premium to the winner, I will give any pacer, owned outside of Coos county, that wins first money in Race No. 10, \$25; or to any trotter, owned outside of Coos county, winning first money in Race No. 10, \$50. F. P. NORTON, Mgr. of Race Track.
