FOUR MILE LAW TO MAKE TENNESSEE A DRY STATE

"Good-Bye Booze" Is the
Song of Tennesseans
Today.

PROHIBITION IS
EFFECTIVE TONIGHT

Manufacture of Intoxicants In
State Prohibited Next
Year.

(By Associated Press.)
NASHVILLE, Tenn., June 30. —
The statute extending the provisions
of the "Four Mile" law to the entire
state, becomes effective at midnight.
Under the provisions of this law
it will be unlawful to sell or supply
liquors, wines, ales or beers as a
beverage in Tennessee. The bill
prohibiting the manufacture of li-
quors, does not become effective until
January 1, 1910. Counsel has been
retained by the interests affected to
test the prohibition measure.

CITY TO HAVE OWN HOSPITAL

Arranges to Take Care of Con-
tagious Diseases in the
Future.

At a meeting of the city council
last night, it was decided that the
city should provide an isolated hos-
pital to take care of smallpox cases
or any other contagious diseases.
The health committee was given
power to arrange for it and the gen-
eral understanding was that a boat
house should be purchased and
equipped for the purpose. This will
be anchored at an isolated part of
the Bay.

The decision to secure and equip
such a hospital carries out the re-
commendation of Dr. E. M. Mings,
city health officer. Dr. Mings has
been urging it for sometime but no
action was taken. Now that the city
has a case of smallpox, it was decid-
ed to take immediate steps in order
that the possibility of an epidemic
would be eliminated.

The securing of the hospital will
also mean a saving to the city im-
mediately. At present, the city has to
pay the expense of the half-dozen
people quarantined at the Miller
boarding house, amounting to ten or
twelve dollars per day. With the
hospital, the patient can be removed
from there, the house fumigated and
as soon as a sufficient period has
elapsed insuring that the people who
have been exposed have not contract-
ed the disease, they will be liberat-

OREGON DAY AT FAIR.

Program For July 9 at Seattle Ex-
position.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 30. — A
tentative program has been arranged
for Oregon day at the Alaska-Yukon-
Pacific exposition on July 9th, as fol-

NO CHANGE IN ELECTION CALL

Delay Action On Taking Up
Special Improvement Bonds
By City.

After considerable discussion last
evening, it was decided not to at-
tempt to amend the call for the spe-
cial city election August 24, which
will provide for a general city bond
issue, to enable the municipality to
take up the special improvement
bond issue. The decision resulted
from a desire to prevent delays in
the matter. Also because the spe-
cial election August 24, will enable
the city, if the proposition carries, to
purchase the "B" street lot.
Councilman Albrecht and others
maintained that if the outstanding
warrants to be taken up or legalized
by a regular city bond issue that the
special improvement bonds will have
a ready sale. But if they should not,
they declared that the city could
ninety days later at the regular city
election submit an amendment to
the charter that would enable it to
take up the special improvement
bond itself.

Hugh McLain and M. E. Whitmore
discussed the matter before the
council. They said that unless pro-
vision was made for marketing the
special improvement bonds, the city
would have difficulty in making the
sewer and street improvements now
proposed. They said the contractors
could not carry the special improve-
ment bonds themselves.

M. E. Whitmore said that he had
made a canvass of the city in an en-
deavor to find a market for these
bonds in case he should take them
at eighty cents on the dollar, a dis-
count of twenty per cent. He said
that if this was the case, the con-
tractors would simply have to charge
twenty per cent more for their work.
He said that he thought it was the duty
of the city council to get this work
done as cheaply as possible and the
only way that he could see how this
could be done would be for the city
to arrange to take the bonds at par
in case other buyers could not be
found.

Councilmen Hennessey, Powers
and Savage said that they had heard
considerable complaint because the
council had not provided that the
special election might grant the re-
quired power to do this. Mayor Straw
and Councilmen Coke were absent
from the meeting, Mayor Straw be-
ing able to be present but a few
minutes.

An electrical ordinance was read
and referred to City Attorney Saver
for examination.

A new building ordinance, prepar-
ed by City Building Inspector Tur-
pen was read and was referred back
to him and City Attorney Saver for
some changes.

City Attorney Saver made a re-
port on the decision in the "B" street
case which provides that the city
must pay the \$10,500 for the prop-
erty in cash instead of by warrant.
The matter was referred to the fi-
nance committee.

F. P. Norton was granted the
privilege of using the city sprinkler
at the fairgrounds race track during
the race meet.

The Chandler Hotel Company was
given a rebate of \$75 on its liquor
license because it had not been able
to open its bar until six weeks after
the date of the license. Councilmen
Nelson and Albrecht opposed grant-
ing them more than \$50 rebate.
Liquor licenses were issued to six
saloons.

City Engineer Sandberg was in-
structed to prepare plans for paving
Second street between Park and
Alder with plank and Second street
between Park and Highland with
bituminous rock.

TAFT'S WARNING TO CONGRESS

TELLS YALE ALUMNI THAT RE-
PUBLICAN PARTY MUST KEEP
ITS PROMISES OR BE RELE-
GATED TO THE REAR.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 30.—
Commencement day at Yale was es-
pecially honored by the presence of
President Taft "seventy-two." Pres-

ident Taft as a "fellow," donned the
robes and walked in the procession
of the several hundreds of officers
of the university and candidates for
degrees.

In a speech before the Yale Alum-
na today, President Taft issued a
warning to congress. He declared
that if the Republican party failed
to live up to its promises and what
was expected of it, it would be re-
legated "to her majesty's opposition."

MURDERS TWO AND SUICIDES

Des Moines Man Slays Parents
of Divorced Wife Near
Valley Junction.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 30.—The
dead body of Calvin L. Page, who
yesterday murdered Mr. and Mrs. El-
mer Jamieson, parents of his divor-
ced wife, near Valley Junction, was
found today near the Jamieson
home. He had committed suicide.

MANY FOWLS ARE STOLEN

Chicken Thieves Make Big
Haul at Condie Poultry
Ranch at Eastport.

One of the biggest chicken thefts
that has been pulled off in a long
time was perpetrated at the Condie
poultry ranch near Eastport this
week when over 100 fowls were
taken. Other ranchers report small-
er losses. The birds are supposed
to have been brought to the Bay and
sold.

The theft at the Condie ranch is
particularly bad as the place is con-
ducted by an aged man who depend-
ed on his poultry and a few cows for
his livelihood.

A long pole with a sponge on the
end of it was found near the Condie
chicken roosts and this is believed
to contain the explanation of how the
robbery was pulled off without Mr.
Condie or others being awakened by
the disturbed birds. A little anaes-
thetic or coal oil on the sponge held
under the dazed chickens' head
would soon put them to sleep and
they would fall easy prey.

A careful search is being made to
ascertain the identity of the thieves.

AFTER SYSTEM IN MISSISSIPPI

Try to Drive Standard Oil Out
of State and Collect
\$11,000,000.

"OPEN SHOP" ORDER
CASE OF TROUBLE

Mills In Pennsylvania, Ohio,
Indiana and Illinois
Affected.

(By Associated Press.)
PITTSBURG, Pa., June 30. — At
midnight tonight more than ten
thousand skilled workmen, members
of the Amalgamated Association of
Iron, Steel and Tin Plate Workers,
employed by the American Sheet and
Tin Plate Company throughout
Pennsylvania, Ohio, Virginia and In-
diana will quit work. At that hour
the "open shop" order of the com-
pany becomes effective. The Amal-
gamated Association is expected to
put up a stern fight against the or-
der.

SURVEY LINE ON DESCHUTES

Harriman Begins Preliminary
Work On Road Through
Central Oregon.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—De-
finite steps toward the beginning of
construction work on the Harriman
railroad into Central Oregon, known
as the Deschutes River Railroad,
were taken when Chief Engineer
George W. Boschke began the as-
sembly of one of the largest engin-
eering and survey crews that has
been sent out from this jurisdiction
in many months. The big gang will
be in charge of Assistant Engineers
Brandon and Holman, the former of
whom has been attached to the sur-
veying party engaged in work in the
Blitter Root, Clearwater and Salmon
River county in Idaho and Montana,
and the latter one of the best loca-
tion engineers in the Harriman
Northwestern service.

This party will leave Portland this
week, providing the complete outfit
needed can be gathered together by
that time. Most of the men detailed
for the stake, and cross-section work
on certain portions of the proposed
route, the exact location of which is
not specified, have their packs al-
ready to leave.

ROAD PAYS WELL.

Klamath Falls Railway Business
\$75,000 First Month.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 30.—
Operating a railroad to this city
is a paying proposition, according to
the report made by the local freight
agent. During the first 30 days that
the Southern Pacific did business in
Klamath Falls the total receipts
from the freight and passenger busi-
ness aggregated \$75,000. The
freight receipts averaged more than
\$2,000 daily. Klamath Falls is the
distributing center for most of the
county, but practically all the freight
received during the past month was
for local merchants. When the Lake-
view shipments begin to come in the
receipts will be greatly enhanced.

FIVE HURT IN EXPLOSION.
