Shell Fish to Seattle.—The last Breakwater took a cargo consignment of clams, crabs and other Coos Bay fish to Seattle for exhibit at the exposition.

Remodel Blanco.—Jas. Ferrey, owner of the Blanco Hotel building, is figuring on remodelling and improving the building. A new front will be put in and other improvements made soon, probably.

Builds Fine House.—Work was begun this morning on a fine residence for Captain Matson in South Marshfield Heights. It is located at the corner of Eleventh and Flanagan avenue, near the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. S. Bargelt. P. M. Tulley has the contract. The house will cost about \$2,100.

Is Fined.—"What are you spreading disease around for?" is the question that was rudely put to John H. Shur, the crippled shoe-string vender yesterday by N. W. Nevis. This led to an altercation in which the old shoe-string vender was worsted and Marshal Carter finally came to the rescue. Nevis was fined \$10 and costs by City Recorder Butler and Shur left on the Plant last night.

Funeral Today.—The body of W. W. Hayes, the well-known Coos county pioneer who died this week, was taken to Coquille today for burial. The funeral services were

held from the Christian Church there. Besides the relatives, a number of friends of the venerable old pioneer attended the services.

Here For Treatment.—Chas. Smith, the well-known pioneer rancher of Kentuck Inlet, is in Marshfield receiving treatment for a paralytic stroke which he sustained a few months ago. He has improved considerably and his many friends hope that a permanent cure will be effected. His daughter, Miss Annie Smith, is here with him.

Exhibit Coal.—Coos Bay has the only coal exhibit in the Oregon building at the Seattle fair, according to advices received by Henry Sengstacken today. The Kentuck Inlet and Libby mines sent up exhibits a short time ago and Beaver Hill will send an exhibit on the next Breakwater. The Coquille Valley mines have not furnished exhibits yet but undoubtedly will do so as some fine coal is being mined there.

May Arrange Race.—Roger Sherman has received advices from his brother-in-law, Prentiss N. Gray, that he will be glad to bring up his fast motor boat, the Konocti, here for a race with A. H. Power's General II. It was hoped to arrange the race for week after next but as Mr. Powers and Mr. Meehan of the Smith Mill, may be out of the city, the date will probably be changed. The Konocti and General II raced twice at San Francisco and each has one victory to its credit.

Arrange For Log Rolling.—At a meeting of the Coos Bay Camp of the Woodmen of the World to be held this evening, it is expected that the exact date of the big "Log Rolling" of the organization to be held in Marshfield the first week in October will be fixed.
