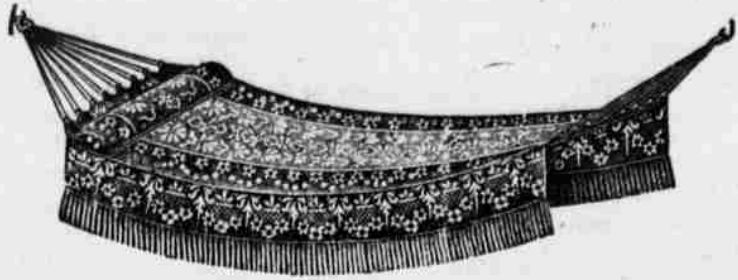

MOTOR BOATS TO RACE HERE

GENERAL II AND KONOCTI LIKE-
LY TO MEET ON COOS BAY
WITHIN A FEW WEEKS—AC-
COUNT OF LAST CONTEST BE-
TWEEN THEM.

It is practically certain that a race between A. H. Powers' fast motor boat, the General II, and Prentiss N. Gray's Konocti will be pulled off on the Bay this fall. Mr. Gray has signified his willingness to bring the Konocti here at some date between now and the latter part of August. Mr. Powers is also willing to have the General II enter the contest.

Each boat has a race to its credit and besides the owners, a large number of motor boat enthusiasts on the coast anxious to have the supremacy of one of them established. On account of the approaching race here, the following account of the last race between the two on the Sacramento river, taken from the "Pacific Motor Boat," will be read with interest:

"The first event of a series of races to determine the speed boat championship of the South Pacific Coast was held at the boathouse of the San Francisco Yacht Club at Sausalito, May 8th, the race being between the 'General II' of Sacramento, and the 'Konocti,' owned by Prentiss Gray of San Francisco. Before an excited and enthusiastic crowd the two boats went over the course in a neck and neck race until the last mile, when General II showed an unusual burst of speed which brought her in ahead of her speedy rival about three boat lengths in a race lasting 27 minutes and 9 seconds. The Konocti was just three seconds behind.

"Konocti had until this time bested every boat which it had been matched with in San Francisco bay and General II had already demonstrated her right to the claim of being the fastest on the Sacramento and one of the fastest in California. Her owners, however, were not content with having her called one of the fastest. They wanted the superlative term or nothing. The performance made by General II, so far proves her champion of the South Coast.

"A record crowd was in attendance, as the day was the opening of the season for the San Francisco Yacht Club, under whose auspices the race was conducted. Hundreds of members and their guests crowded the boathouse, and hundreds more lined the Sausalito shore.

"The joyous Sacramento yachtmen down to see the contest were not the only ones pleased to see the General's victory, for the winning craft is much the smaller boat of the two, and this fact gained it the sympathy of the onlookers. The General is 30 feet in length and has a 24-29, two cycle, three cylinder Smalley engine, 4 1/2 x 4 1/2 bore and stroke. The Konocti is 38 feet in length, and is equipped with a 40-50 horsepower, six cylinder, four cycle Sterling engine, 5 1/2 x 6 bore and stroke.

"The General II has a record of victories behind it in the east, where it won the Saginaw river championship, and the Saginaw valley championship, developing a speed of 25 1/2 miles per hour.

"The course traveled by the opposing boats is reckoned to be just under 11 miles. It began and ended at the boathouse, and swung around the Southampton lighthouse in the upper bay. The General tagged her rival from the start, until both boats were well out of the straits on the run for home, and then, aided by the wind, made the gain that won the race.

"The two boats are so evenly paced that the result of the next races of the series cannot by any means be taken as a certain victory for the General. The Konocti was foul and the wind on the home stretch held her back, as she rides high out of the water, much more than it did the rival boat. On the other hand, the Konocti's engine developed more speed than at any other time in its history. It was making 920 revolutions, which is 10 more than Gray ever got out of it before."
