CONTRACT IS LET FOR NEW SCHOOL

H. V. Wood Secures the Bunker Hill and Bay Park Work.

H. V. Wood was yesterday awarded the contract for the construction of the new school house in the Bunker Hill and Bay Park District. Mr. Wood's bid was \$6,780. The work will begin at once and the building will be rushed to completion. It is hoped to have it ready for occupancy by the time for the opening of the school term in September.

The building is a frame structure, 36 by 68 and will contain four rooms. W. S. Turpen is the architect.

BANDON'S NEW SCHOOL.

The Bandon Recorder says: "In the report of the school meeting last week we stated that the district issued warrants to the amount of \$15,000 owing to the fact that the building cost more than the architect's estimate. This may have been somewhat misleading and some seem to have gained the impression that the architect figured \$15,000 less than the structure cost, however, this is not the case. The district voted a bond of \$25,000 but \$5,000 of these bonds were never issued. The architect's estimate of the building complete and furnished was \$25,000, and we are told that it is a better building than either the Marshfield or North Bend buildings each of which cost several thousand dollars more."
