EDITOR HAS APPENDICITIS.

THE EDITOR of the Anthon, Io., Herald, has evidently been having a bad case of appendicitis and has had the appendix lopped off. He is still sore physically, financially and mentally for this is the way he walls in the last issue of his paper.

"Between \$4,000 and \$5,000 in money has left this community since January 1 for operations for appendicitis. The operation, hospital expenses and trimmings which are added by doctors and nurses amount to \$250 for each patient, and there have been in the neighborhood of twenty cases since the above stated time. The charges of the doctors who operate is a little less than stealing—not much, though. He slaps you on an operating table, orders an understudy to apply ether, grabs a knife, cuts a half moon in the district just northeast of your right hand trouser pocket, reaches in a hand, pulls out your entire stock on hand of intestines, fingers around a few moments until he finds a little sprig that looks like the top end of a stock of asparagus, takes a pair of scissors, clips it off, drops it into a spittoon, takes a needle and thread and closes the incision. He is a half hour and charges \$100. If he makes a mistake and clips off your solar plexus and you never come out from the influence of the ether, he simply reports your case hopeless, and when the funeral services are over the relatives bring in a soul stirring obituary to the local paper claiming "that the Lord needed you in his vineyard and he took you for his own." If the gangrene, ptomaine poisoning, heartburn or any other ache or pain sets in and it is necessary to have your bay window torn out and some false work substituted, he finds out first what your financial circumstances are, and if the report is favorable, he calls in one or two more "assistants" of the hospital and they go into your fat. This attempt at remodeling will cost from \$400 to \$1,000 more and consumes about three hours' time. The charges in this case depending on that all important report as to your finances. falls short. They clinch and the gong sounds with men resting in clinch.

Round 7.—Neill rushes to Carranza's corner and slips hard right to Carranza's head, Carranza breaks ground. Neill follows and they clinch. Neill lands good ones on Carranza's face and brings blood. Carranza seems to be in difficulty. They clinch and Neill's supporters call on Neill to put him out. Neill smiles and shakes his head. Neill's round.

Round 8.—Men meet and immediately fall into clinch. Neill lands hard one to heart, Carranza lands good ones to face and kidneys. Neill uppercuts four times. Carranza seems to be in pain but shows courage. Hard in fighting. They break and Carranza lands hard right to body. They clinch and exchange good lefts and rights to body and head. Neill has best of it.

Round 9.—They swing hard rights and Carranza lands. They clinch. Carranza fights hard. On the break Carranza slips over a good one to the jaw. Neill has his head rocked by left and right. He falls into clinch. Neill takes punishment but keeps his smile, and speaks low to one of his seconds. Carranza's round.

Round 10.—Neill rushes to Carranza's corner and lands a vicious swing to Carranza's shoulder. He does better with left to head. They clinch and Neill laughs. On the break Carranza lands fine swing to head. Neill again smiles. Carranza again lands left uppercuts. Honors about even.

Round 11.—They meet near Carranza's corner. Clinch and exchange light ones. On the break Carranza keeps away and dances around the ring with Neill following. Again they clinch and Carranza fights hard and fast. Neill covers well. Carranza lands hard uppercut and swings hard with right for jaw. He falls to land and Neill slips in hard uppercut. Neill jars Carranza with right to ribs.

Round 12.—Neill lands good left to body. Carranza lands a vicious right swing to head. For the first time Neill smile fades away. Neill comes back and clinches. Neill lands good right to body and left to head in clinch. They break and Carranza walks over to his own corner evidently thinking gong had sounded. Neill speaks to him and says, "Come back the gong didn't sound." Carranza turns and goes back in clinch. The gong sounded with men in clinch and each trying uppercuts.

Round 13.—Neill rushes and lands vicious right to jaw. Carranza lands hard right to body. Carranza follows with neat left uppercut. Neill comes back with hard right to jaw. Neill rocks Carranza's head with left. They clinch and Carranza covers well. Neill has best of it.

Round 14.—Each lands hard right to body. Neill slips in hard left uppercut. Carranza lands hard right to head and in clinch following lands hard to kidneys. Neill pumps good one in ribs. Carranza breaks ground. Carranza has best of this round.

Round 15.—Carranza lands left jab to face and follows with right swing to jaw. Neill lands hard right to body. They clinch and Neill has best of infighting. They break and Carranza again lands good one on jaw with right.

Round 16.—Carranza lands left jab to face and misses right swing. They clinch. Neill uses a peculiar uppercut and rocks Carranza's head. Carranza returns this with right to head. On the break Carranza lands clean one to Neill's ear. Neill now boxes cleverly. This is good round.

Round 17.—Neill leads with left to body. Carranza cleverly avoids hard right and retreats with Neill following around ring. Carranza lands hard right to cheek. This blow though well placed lacked steam. Neill comes back with hard uppercut to body. Carranza breaks and for a moment covers up at some distance from Neill. They clinch and both fight desperately. Neill's round.

Round 18.—Carranza lands loud right to body. Neill lands left to body. Neill keeps advancing and Carranza retreating around ring. Neill seems stronger in this round. Carranza comes back with right to body. They clinch and wrestle about ring. On break, Carranza lands

right to head. Neill comes back with hard one to ribs. Again they clinch and each land good left and right jabs. After break, Neill lands hard on head.

Round 19.—They meet in center of ring. Neill leads with stiff left to head. Carranza covers well. Carranza lands on head but blow is ineffective. Neill smiles. They clinch and Neill lands good short arm jabs. On the break, Carranza lands lightly on Neill's head. Honors about even.

Round 20.—Both come slowly from their corners. Both seem fresh. They shake hands. Carranza leads and they clinch. The infighting becomes terrific and each man lands good ones. They break and Neill follows Carranza around ring. Each man tries hard for knockout. Neill swings hard and falls into ropes when Carranza gets away. Neill lands good right swing to body. Carranza lands left to face. Neill again lands left swing to head. They clinch. Gong sounds as men are doing hard infighting in center of ring.

Referee Phelan raises hand of each and the fight is a draw.

FAST SIX ROUNDS.

O'Neill-Parsons Go Mighty Good One For a Preliminary.

The O'Neill-Parsons six-round preliminary was one of the best little bouts ever put up here. O'Neill weighed in at 125 and Parsons 133 but O'Neill's experience more than offset Parsons' greater weight although the latter injected all kinds of steam into the go. Referee Phelan's decision of a draw was popular with the audience.

At 9:40 Kid Parsons entered the ring and took northeast corner. O'Neill entered few moments later and took southwest corner. Both the little fellows were heartily cheered. O'Neill steps across ring and shakes hands with Parsons.

Round 1.—They meet center of ring. Spar for some time. O'Neill leads and lands left swing to head. They clinch. Lively fighting, each land lefts and rights to body and head. Honors even.

Round 2.—Again spar. Parsons on defensive clinch and mix things. Lively exchange of lefts, each landing hard. Honors even. O'Neill seems cleverer but Parsons strong and willing. Even.

Round 3.—They meet center of ring. O'Neill leads with left to head. Parsons crosses with quick short blow to jaw. O'Neill seemed dazed. They mix and fight furiously with hard lefts and rights to head. In the clinch, Parsons lands hard right to kidneys. O'Neill is groggy. Crowd yells to Parsons to "finish him." O'Neill hangs on and recovers. Parsons round by big margin.

Round 4.—In this round the men spar cautiously. O'Neill very aggressive. O'Neill leads with hard left to face. Parsons clinches. They fight hard in clinch, but O'Neill seems best. Parsons appears tired. O'Neill's round.

Round 5.—They immediately clinch following a vicious swing by O'Neill which Parsons ducks. In the clinch O'Neill lands several hard uppercuts. Parsons comes back with good swings to head and body. Both men are fighting hard and fast. They brought the crowd to its feet. O'Neill is aggressive but Parsons fights hard and seems to have more steam in his punches. Honors even.

Round 6.—They shake hands. Again they spar. O'Neill advancing around ring. Parsons careful. O'Neill leads but fails short. Parsons clinches. They wrestle and crowd asks referee to break them. In the clinch they land fast and fight furiously. Hard jab to head by Parsons. Uppercuts and swings to kidneys by O'Neill. At sound of gong they are in center of ring fighting hard.

Notes of the Fight.

Mayor L. J. Simpson of North Bend was one of the spectators. While the crowd was growing restless for the fight to start, he stepped into the ring and challenged the mayor of Marshfield to a "fistic duel" but Mayor Straw was not present and so the audience was deprived of the sport.

Chas. Jost challenged the winner of the Neill-Carranza bout for a \$500 side bet. The challenge was made just before the main event started. Carranza and Neill both tipped the scales at 158 at 5 o'clock Saturday evening, being exactly at weight.

Just prior to the fight, Neill said: "I was never more confident of winning. I shall do my best. I am in excellent condition."

Carranza said: "I am going to win."

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
