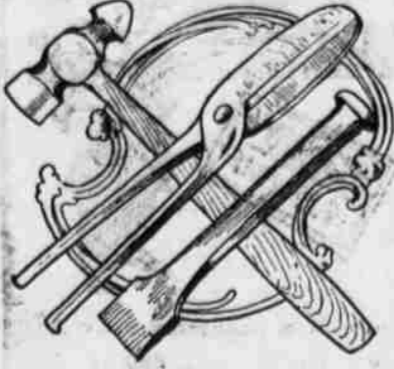

### SUMNER FOURTH WAS GLORIOUS CELEBRATION

Times' Correspondent Gives Details of Big Doings at Lively Little City—Baseball Games.

SUMNER, Ore., July 5.—Monday, July 5, found all Sumner tired, but happy in the realization that we have had a grand celebration, and in the memory of many kindly expressions of commendation made by our guests in regard to our efforts to please and entertain. The day was ushered in by the time honored salute at sunrise. At 10 a. m. the parade formed at the ball grounds, passed down Main street, thence to the pavillion. Here the president of the day, Mr. Geo. Ross, in his habitually happy way introduced the Orator Hon. E. C. Burroughs of Coquille City, who delivered an address in which eloquence oratory, wit and humor, were happily blended and which won for him a prominent place in the regard of his hearers. Judge Coke Dismisses Action of Woman for Legal Separation—Another May Be Involved In It. Judge John S. Coke has handed down a decision in the divorce case of Cora E. Mosena vs. Jas. L. Some of the evidence introduced seemed to tangle up a Marshfield man with the case, indicating that he had inspired Mrs. Mosena to bring the suit.
