ROBBED IN BROAD DAYLIGHTLone Bandit Gets Away With
Booty After Wounding
Cashier.J. L. LYENS IN
SERIOUS CONDITIONBlood Hounds Follow Trail of
Robber to River Near
Log Boom.

EVERETT, Wash., July 7.—No trace of the lone robber who late yesterday afternoon held up the Bank of Commerce, seriously wounding the cashier, J. L. Lyens, and who secured money believed to amount to several hundred dollars, has been found. Blood hounds were working until 3:30 this morning and followed a trail to a log boom in the river and returning they went beneath a railroad trestle nearby. The impression is that he may have had a boat moored nearby and escaped that way. A close watch on the river is being kept. The thief discarded his blood stained necktie and collar, a false moustache and a coat. Cashier Lyens's wound is serious. The outcome will not be known for several days.

KING PETER FAINTS.

FEAR SCHOONER
HAS BEEN LOSTJ. F. Adler With Twenty Aboard
Missing From Alaska
Port.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—The schooner Monterey, Captain Anderson, arriving from Kuskowin, Alaska, reports the possible loss of the missionary schooner J. F. Adler and a score of lives. The Adler sailed from Seattle June 3 with a crew of eight and 12 or 13 passengers. When the Monterey arrived at Bethel to which place the Adler was bound, Captain Anderson was informed by Indian trappers that the Adler had been sighted struggling in a heavy storm but had disappeared. Captain Anderson and another boat went out to sea in search for the missing schooner but found no trace of it. It is possible the Adler took refuge in Bristol Bay.

THINK ABLER SAFE.

NEWLANDS TALKS ON TARIFF BILL

Says President Taft Can't Veto
Measure Unless He Wishes
to Record Breach of Republican Party's Faith.

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7.—Speaking on the evolution of the tariff schedule today, Senator Newlands said: "No material changes can now be made in the bill and the only question before us is whether we may not by some general provision plant the seed of a rational tariff system under which excessive tariff duties may be gradually reduced and the tariff taken out of politics. The tariff bill is not a piece of original legislation but a measure intended to correct the abuses of an existing law. It would be difficult for the president to accomplish what he desires by a veto unless he wishes to record his condemnation of the party's breach of faith and his only alternative will be to accept the bill and press on later for the ameliorative legislation." Newlands spoke on the tariff affecting the Philippine products and spoke favorably of

shaping the government of those islands so as to prepare the Filipinos for self government and ultimately yield the islands to the government of their people.

With the Senate rapidly approaching the day of final consideration of the tariff bill, attention is being given to the selection of the conferees on the part the Senate and the House, whose duty it will be to attempt to bring the two bodies into an agreement on the measure. Gossip has it that Aldrich will pick besides himself as representative of the Republicans in the Senate Hale of Maine, Penrose of Pennsylvania, Burrows of Michigan, Smoot of Utah. The democratic senators who will participate in the conference will probably be Daniels of Virginia, Mooney of Mississippi, and Bailey of Texas. In the House, Speaker Cannon, according to reports, will probably select Payne of New York, Dalzell of Pennsylvania, Boutell of Illinois, McCall of Massachusetts, and either Needham of California or Calderhead of Kansas, as the republican members and Champ Clark of Missouri, Underwood of Alabama, Griggs of Georgia, as the Democratic members.

TUG COLUMBIA
TO INNER BAYWill Be Replaced By the Tug
Astoria For the Bar and
Outside Service.

The tug Columbia will be replaced for service on the Coos Bay bar and outside by the tug Astoria from the Columbia. This was announced today by Manager L. F. Falkenstein of the Simpson Lumber Company and Captain Magee, Wm. Magee and a deck hand left on the Alliance this afternoon to bring the Astoria down from the Columbia at once. The decision followed the annual inspection of the Columbia by Inspectors Welden and Ames yesterday. They found that the Columbia needed rather extensive repairs to make her seaworthy and able to withstand the strain that she might be subjected to on the bar sometime.

As these repairs and overhauling would cost several thousand dollars, it was decided that it would be best to retain the Columbia for towing in the inner bay and bring the Astoria down from the north. The Astoria is owned by the Simpson Lumber Company and since shipping has grown rather dull in the north, there has not been much business for her there.

The Columbia, is an old craft, and whether she would be worth the overhauling and repairs necessary could not be determined until the work was underway. However, she will be able to give much service in the inner bay.

It is expected that Capt. Magee will have charge of the Astoria after her arrival here.

KANSAS TOWN IS INUNDATED;
1,500 PEOPLE ON ROOFSRACE HORSES

MATCH RACE TODAY.

This afternoon, a match race between Herron's Dr. Rowell and Hill's Mary Dunn is being pulled off. It is for five-eighths of a mile and for \$100 a side.

Today the race horses that have given the local Fairgrounds course a lively appearance for the last few weeks are being taken away. F. S. Hill of San Francisco, left last night on the M. F. Plant with his string. W. W. Cardwell left this morning overland with King Kohr and Alexander Roseburg, leaving The Councillor behind. Tomorrow W. P. Norton with trainers Dan Starr and Chas. McGeorge will leave for Salem with Mr. Norton's Belle N and Zemoak and Sam Marsden's Mack N. Mr. Norton will leave the horses at Salem in care of the trainers until the Umpqua Valley circuit races start next month. They will go out over the old Coos Bay wagon road and ship from Roseburg.

Messrs. Hill and Baulieu with Jockey Enos will leave on the Eureka tomorrow for Eureka with Utica and Mary Dunn. They have been talking of selling the pair but it is not likely that any deal will be made.

O. J. Seeley was talking of buying King Kohr from W. W. Cardwell but changed his mind. Mr. Seeley today disposed of the mare that he bought from the Hume estate to Alfred Nichols. Cardwell is rather sore on the game and said yesterday that he intended to quit it. He has thirty-one standard bred horses at Roseburg besides the string he had here and said he wanted to close out the whole thing.

All the horsemen are well pleased with their treatment while on the Bay.

Here it might be remarked that the crowds who attended the races this year have been highly congratulating the management on the way the races were pulled off. Last year there was considerable criticism because of the delays between heats. This year, there was little or no delay, the events being pulled off in rapid succession. At the start of this meeting, President Powers instructed the judges to give the horsemen notice that they must have their animals ready to respond inside of fifteen minutes. In case they failed, the race would be started without the slow ones who would also be out their entrance fees. The horsemen all fell in line and tedious delays were eliminated.

CITIES HARD ON CHILDREN.

Educator Blames Troubles of Rising
Generation to City Life.

Luckey of the University of Nebraska before the Physical Education Department of the National Education Association. He asserted the ratio of persons living in cities is so great as leave no argument against the charge that the cities and city life is responsible for the lowered physical standards among the school children.

Terrific Rains In Eastern and
Northern Parts of State
the Cause.FIVE INCHES FALL
DURING ONE NIGHTOttawa, Topeka, Kansas City
and Other Points Fear
Developments.

KANSAS CITY, July 7.—Patterson, Mo., a town of 1,500 inhabitants, fifty miles north of here, is ten feet under water and hundreds of people spent the night perched on the roofs of their houses. Fifty row boats are engaged today in removing the marooned people to places of safety. The rains continue and the flood of water is still rising.

Aided by a two-inch rainfall and the rising of the rivers above, Missouri and Kaw rivers showed here today raises of over a foot in the past twenty-four hours. It is predicted that a further rise will bring flood conditions tomorrow. Already several small towns are under water.

FLOOD AT TOPEKA.

Six Inches of Rain Falls During
