required to pay from the date of the issuance of the license, but it was pointed out that owing to the action of the council at the time, Mr. Jost had not had opportunity to get ready by that time.

Nine liquor licenses were granted last night.

The firemen were ordered to clear all refuse and debris from the city park. Residents of that section had complained to Health Officer Mingus about clam shells being left there, causing a stench.

An ordinance providing new regulations for the fire department and allowing \$1 for responding to fire alarms and fifty cents additional per hour for fighting fires was passed.

The city recorder and city attorney were instructed to hasten the work on North Cedar street so that the improvement can be completed.

Attorney Feeney, who represented City Attorney Snover at the meeting, stated that the reason given for declaring the Myrtle Point bond issue void, that is the failure to secure a petition requesting the submission of the matter to a vote, did not apply to the proposed bond issue in Marshfield. He said that in Marshfield the question was an amendment to the city charter instead of being the direct bond issue question.

A large number of bills were allowed.

SEND BODY HOME.

Sergeants-at-Arms Will Accompany Cushman's Remains.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7. — No congressional committee will accompany the body of late Congressman Cushman to his home in Washington, but instead the Senate and House will be represented by two deputy sergeants-at-arms who will leave New York tonight with the funeral car. This of course is not in deference to the wishes of the widow but to the Washington congressional delegation who at a meeting decided that public business and especially the tariff in which Cushman himself was vitally interested required their attendance in Washington.

AUTO MISHAP DELAYED THEM

Col. Grimes, J. R. Smith and Col. Hofer In Accident Near Burns.

BURNS, Ore., July 7.—The ninth session of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress closed here having a successful session. Colonel Hofer, president, Mr. Grimes and Mr. Smith, of Coos Bay, were delayed by an automobile mishap, but arrived by private conveyance the last day. Colonel Wood and Walter F. Mathews are here from Portland, William Marsh from Seattle, William H. Gibson, George H. Shallenberger, Rielly Atkinson and W. M. Davis represent Boise, and there are delegates from Malheur and Grant counties. R. B. Post represents Prineville.

Interesting talks relative to development of Eastern Oregon and Idaho and the building of a railroad from Coos Bay to Boise have been made by Rielly Atkinson, Addison Bennett, Colonel Hofer, William H. Gibson, William Grimes, George H. Shallenberger and Mr. Marsh. The tone of which was that with the great possibilities here apparent the people should move to help themselves if the railroads continue to neglect this region. Colonel Wood explained the district-built railroad plan. Sentiment for the plan is very strong here. The address of welcome was responded to by Rielly Atkinson of Boise, who is a practical entertaining speaker.

EPWORTH LEAGUE MEETS.
