BERLIN, July 7.—A Berlin manufacturer has put the first "airship trunk" on the market for the accommodation of travelers who contemplate touring the heavens. The trunk is of aluminum, and contains a compact apothecary's outfit for ministering to the pangs of "aerial seasickness." The trunk is to be fastened to the inner wall of the airship cabin, so as not to roll about in a "heavy sea."

1. Don't be afraid of falling; the vessel is solid and derailment cannot take place.

GEO. D. WATKINS ON RECIPROCITY

MARSHFIELD MAN GIVES HIS VIEWS ABOUT TRADING AT HOME AND TRADING WITH MAIL ORDER HOUSES.

The following communication by Geo. D. Watkins has been handed to The Times with a request that it be published in this paper:

To the editor: Some of the local papers contain frequent editorials on patronizing home merchants; they deliver frequent and caustic lectures on people who patronize mail order houses and admonish us in season and out, to send no money away; to keep it here and spend it at home.

I am a firm believer in reciprocity. I believe it is right to help the man live who helps me. I believe in standing by the folks and hence, in a way, I am in sympathy with the sentiments expressed in these papers, but I think they stop far short of the end.

Perhaps it is not policy to go further; the whole truth is not always popular and hence the average man with his weather eye on the ham sandwich, knows what to say and what not.

I believe the patron of the mail order house is not entitled to all the loose bricks; I think there are other shining marks along the same line. Within the last two or three years, several large structures have been built in Marshfield wholly or partially by imported labor. Within the same time a large amount of other work both private and public has been performed at this place by people who do not live here; by people who do not spend their money here; by people "who do not help pay the taxes, nor keep up the schools, churches," etc.—and by people who sent the money earned out of the country, while our own people who would have been glad to do this work either twirled their thumbs in idleness, sought employment elsewhere, or left the country.

Nor is this all. Men have been and are being especially imported to fill many important and lucrative positions, both public and private, when our own people, equally capable are given no consideration whatever.

Are our merchants and business men responsible for this state of affairs? Are they blameless? Have they set their faces against this manner of doing business in any way? Have they voluntarily contributed to the pay of these importations and neglected to stand by the home folks? If we are not innocent, then why should we croak about the man who patronizes the mail order house?

The merchants and business men have the same privileges as he; they can sell their goods and rent their buildings to the people to whom they have paid their money in Eureka, Portland, Oklahoma or elsewhere. That would be consistent "pulling together," "working in harmony," and "boosting," as exemplified in Marshfield. There is consistency in some things but not in all, the old adage to the contrary none the less.

The labor of the man who works either hands or brain is his stock in trade. In order to live he must market that stock in some way. If the men who sell the use of property, pants, or asparagus purchase labor elsewhere, what right have they to either ask or expect the patronage of the former for the sale of their wares?

As an excuse I am told that outside parties build and work cheaper than our folks. I don't believe it. Even so, goods and rents are cheaper elsewhere, and there you are. Don't be a hog!

It occurs to me we had better practice what we preach or else keep silent. "Silence (sometimes) is golden," it is said, and this is one of the times.
