

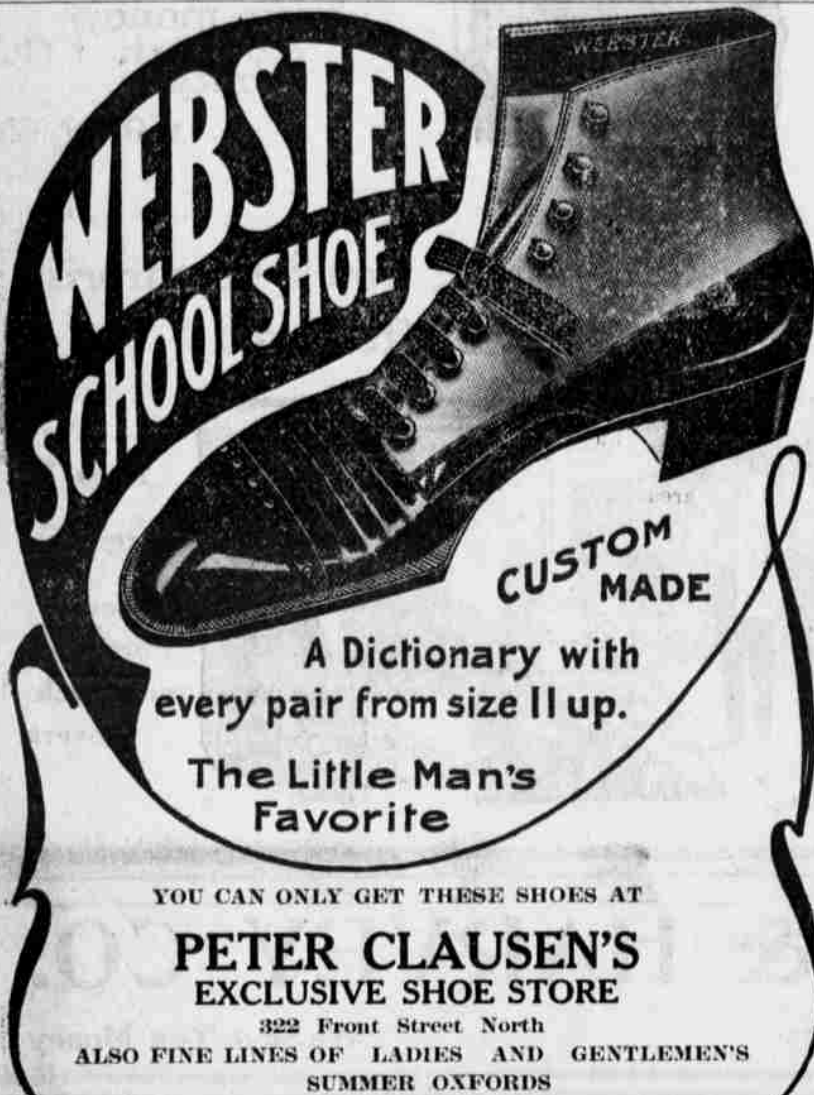

Norway Couple In Runaway En Route to Summer.

The Coquille Herald says: "Walter Robinson, Miss Dell Clinton and Miss Opal Sanders of Norway, started for the ball at Sumner and near Rinck Creek their horses shied at some sacks of cement which lay near the road and became unmanageable and in making a short turn on rough ground, threw the occupants from the vehicle. She was severely bruised from head to foot, one ankle being sprained, necessitating a pair of crutches. Miss Sanders came off more luckily, being very little hurt.

## LITTLE TALKS ABOUT TOWN

A GRIST OF COOS BAY GOS-SIP GATHERED HERE AND THERE ABOUT THINGS OF PASSING INTEREST.

"I was up Catching Inlet this week and I was surprised to find the extent of the coal deposits there," remarked Colby Perry yesterday. "Why nearly every rancher owns his own coal mine, having either sunken a shaft or a prospect that has shown that there is coal on his place. It is good coal, too, apparently being the same as the Beaver Hill vein. I don't know of any other place in the country that has such a coal field."

"That advertising brings results was clearly demonstrated to me Friday morning," remarked Henry Sengstacken. "About 6 o'clock, my telephone bell rang and I got up fully expecting to hear of someone being very ill or of something serious. It was merely a man who wanted a job of slashing at Eastside that I had advertised in the want columns of The Times the night before. Next time, I guess I'll have to attach my office hours to the ad, to save being awakened during the night."

"J. F. Mundy, who has been drilling for oil near Sutherland, north of Roseburg, and who will probably come here soon to drill this field, is an old friend of Colby Perry's," remarked D. Y. Stafford yesterday. "Mr. Mundy comes originally from Illinois and has devoted his efforts to the oil fields, meeting with good success in Oklahoma, Texas and other fields. He is tied up with some strong capitalists who are always willing to finance what he considers a good chance. He has made lots of money for his backers too. At Medford, he unearthed the big coal deposit recently while drilling for oil. If there is oil here, I am confident that Mr. Mundy will get it."

E. M. Andrews is now in Roseburg in conference with Mr. Mundy. Mr. Andrews secured options and leases on large tracts around here, and I. S. Kaufman is getting additional leases for him. The leases or options are on a royalty basis, the owners of the land getting one-eighth of the oil taken out. On the options, the company pays twenty-five cents an acre per year as long as they hold them.

Made Quick Trip.—Wm. Wade, Tom Goodale and Sell Ireland returned last evening from Roseburg, having made the trip via Myrtle Point in about eleven hours running time. They had to stop a number of places to remove stones and other obstructions.
