was coming. Wilson was apparently dazed and was slow to get off but finally started to get over on the side and climb down.

Just then the log came down the chute at a terrific clip. When near Wilson, it struck something and turned, bounding out of the regular channel and striking him with awful force.

He was killed instantly, his head and body being badly crushed. Came Here From Canada.

Wilson is thought to have come here from Canada. He was about fifty years old and evidently a widower. He spoke about mills in British Columbia to acquaintances but was not inclined to form close friendships. He had worked as timber cruiser.

For a time after coming to Coos county, he worked for Archie Kruse on the Coquille, later worked for the Smith-Powers Logging Company and about three months ago entered the employ of the Pierce Camp. So far as known, the little daughter is the only relative he ever spoke of.

This morning after hearing the evidence of Ralph Noel, who witnessed the tragedy, Emmett Pierce, Virgil Matson and J. Alkern, a coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental death. The jury consisted of W. E. Dungan, A. G. Aiken, E. W. Bernitt, J. J. McDonald, John Josephson and A. E. Kruse.

AT AGE OF 105 STICKS TO WHISKY AND TOBACCO

NEW YORK, July 8.—Joshua Zeitlin, living in Brooklyn, celebrated his 105th birthday anniversary July 4. He is in good health and says he will live to be 120.
