

TELLS LEGEND OF MILLICOMA

Lewis C. Garrigus of Portland,
Tells of Origin of the
Name.

For some time past, there has been considerable discussion as to the origin of the name "Millicoma" and the legend attached to it. Lewis C. Garrigus of Portland who has been extensively interested in Coos Bay for some time and who played the town site of Millicoma was known to have investigated the story of Millicoma and in order to get the matter straight, J. M. Upton wrote to him inquiring about it. Today Mr. Upton received the following interesting letter from him:

"I have your esteemed favor of June 29, asking about the name 'Millicoma' which I gave to the townsite played by me, and now adopted by a coterie of gentlemen of your little city for their club.

"Of course you are aware of the fact that the north branch of Coos River bears the name, and some one gave me a legend to the effect that it was the name of an Indian chieftain whose remains are supposed to rest somewhere in the neighborhood of the 'Golden Falls'—probably in a mausoleum carved in the solid stone covered by the falls.

"The legend, as I recall it, was that this Indian was a young chief of the kingly race of the Montezumas who escaped the Spanish massacre of his race, came north, was adopted by the Cayuse Indians and became their chief. If this legend is not true it ought to be.

"I adopted the name for my townsite in honor of the 'Royal Montezumas,' and am pleased to have it perpetuated by you gentlemen, each of whom, no doubt, is a 'royal good fellow,' and worthy the race from which the name is said to have been derived.

"Wishing yourself and the 'Millicoma Club' the greatest success, I beg to remain, yours very sincerely,

FORMER COOS BAY BOY BASEBALL MANAGER

Sidney B. Smith Who Was Born and
Raised Here Makes Good On
Diamond.

The Eugene Guard says: Sidney B. Smith, playing manager of the Eugene Colts, was born twenty-three years ago. More Coast leaguers and big baseball players have pawed the diamonds of the bush leagues of Coos county than in any other single part of the northwest, so no friend of Sid's was surprised when he took to baseball on the Pacific Grove high school (California) team in 1902.

In 1903 he returned to his native town lots and showed his prowess in the little league of coast towns. Then he was persuaded by his parents to remove to Eugene, and readily came as they were paying the largest salary at that time. He immediately entered upon his career in the Eugene high school. When he was not playing baseball he planned and played basketball, and in that field he formed his first conception of being a manager.

In 1907 he played outfield on the University line under Hugo Bezdek. In that year he was the best base-run around the team. In the spring and summer of that year he took the Springfield team into his care and put out the best team that the sawmill city has ever had, winning the Lane county pennant. The next season he longed for a little larger field, and played in the Tri-City league with the Vancouver team. He was picked on the all Tri-City team. Other players picked were White, Pender, Coleman and Fay. Smith played shortstop. He batted .416 and fielded .844.

This year Sid Smith and Jay McCormick are managing the Eugene Colts, and have not suffered a defeat in a regular game. Smith is now playing second base. His style is to make the easy ones good, and to show his dash in the pinches and in going after the hard ones. His darling is best demonstrated on the bases, and he has no difficulty in getting on, for while a little man he always hits well.

As a manager Smith is popularly supposed to make money. But that is not due to short-sighted policy of playing poor teams or using poor material. He has a large acquaintance among ball players, and if a position needs bracing up he does not hesitate to get the bracer. On that account, Eugene men have seen the best amateurs in the state play at different times, and the present team has the indication of being a winner.

Locals Take Another Very Poor
Game—May Recruit
Team Soon.

Marshfield won another very punk ball game from North Bend at the race track grounds by a score of thirteen to eight. Myrtle Point was to have played Marshfield here yesterday and Coquille to have played North Bend at North Bend, but owing to heavy rain in the valley Saturday night, the excursion from there to the Bay was called off and so North Bend came to Marshfield.

There was a very light attendance, the gate receipts being only about \$30.

The Marshfield team was recruited by three new men, Collins of the United States Artillery survey corps, playing left field, Langworthy playing right field and George Perry playing center field. Meller, the important pitcher who fell down so bad in the previous two games, returned to Portland last week and Thompson was on the slab but was hit pretty hard and this coupled with errors and misplays by his support made it more of a comedy than a ball game. Hull lasted four innings for North Bend, then Williams pitched an inning and his arm went lame and Thompson was called in. Wilson caught and had numerous passed balls, dropping many others.

Troch who has been catching for Marshfield, plans to go north tomorrow to pick up a few players for Manager Burkhardt. Unless he returns with some who can put a little snap in the game, it is feared that the attendance here will fall off even worse than it did at yesterday's game.

A feature of yesterday's game was the efforts of the sluggers to pull down some premiums that the Hub Clothing and Shoe Company offered for hard hitting. The prizes are a Stetson hat for a three bagger and a suit of clothes for a home run. McCutcheon succeeded in getting the hat the first time up but nobody else came near it. McCutcheon through errors by North Bend succeeded in getting clear around on a nice little single but this could hardly be classed a home run.
