GOOD TIMES ARE COMING

J. L. BOWMAN OF PORTLAND, ARRIVES ON BAY—ENTHUSIASTIC OVER PROGRESS HERE AND GENERAL PROSPERITY.

J. L. Bowman, proprietor of the Woolen Mill Store, arrived here from Portland, last evening via Drain to spend a week or ten days on the Bay looking after interests here and visiting relatives. Mrs. Bowman will not be able to make her usual summer trip here this summer as Mr. Bowman, Jr., the first son to arrive to gladden and rule the Bowman home a few weeks ago, does not want to travel on the high seas or the stage for a time yet.

"Marshfield never looked so good to me as it does at present," said Mr. Bowman this morning. "They have completed the paving and other improvements since I was here before and it is remarkable what an improvement in the appearance of the town it makes. Everybody is talking of Coos Bay on the outside and there is bound to be a remarkable growth here shortly."

"Portland is booming as usual, the tourist business there this year exceeding all previous seasons."

"Business is rapidly picking up and the old high tide of prosperity is bound to be reached soon. Several months ago when I was in the east, business was nearly back to normal conditions but it takes about six months for it to reach across the continent. When they have hard times in the east, it is about six months before they feel it on the Pacific coast and its prosperity is about the same time late in reaching here. Coos Bay is always one of the last places in the country to feel the touch of hard times on the outside and consequently does not get effect of returned prosperity until late."

"Prices of everything are going up and this more than anything else restores confidence and enthusiasm in the business world. A man likes to invest on a rising market but he holds back if the market is standing still or on the downward trend. Prices of farm crops are unusually high. July wheat is up to \$1.20 and the other day I was up to my brother's farm in Washington and while there, he sold his hay crop for \$10 per ton on the farm—a price he had never received before."

"There has been a marked advance in some grades of cloth of about thirty per cent but for the present at least, we will not increase the retail price of clothing."

While here, Mr. Bowman will assist Manager Rotnor of the local store in taking an inventory of it.
