lowing streets with bituminous rock was taken last night:

Front street from the city hall to Alder street.

Third street from Central avenue to Commercial avenue.

Fourth street from Central avenue to Commercial avenue.

Second street south from the present paying to Anderson avenue.

Central avenue from Second to Fourth street.

Commercial avenue from Broadway to a point 100 feet west of Second street.

Second street, Central avenue to Commercial avenue.

A petition to have Third street between Commercial and Central avenues planked instead of paved with bituminous rock was presented by R. K. Booth but was turned down.

Other Business.

A special meeting was called for Friday night to arrange for a right of way for the proposed sewage system in South Marshfield between Broadway and the Bay. There is no street that can be used and right of way will have to be secured from the railroad company.

Alias warrants were ordered issued for the collection of assessments on North and South Cedar streets. The property will be ordered sold for the assessments unless the property owners pay at once.

C. A. Pennock was ordered refunded an over assessment.

An extension of thirty days was granted the contractor on the South Broadway planking because he said he was unable to get planks. Councilman Powers said there was no reason why the mill could not furnish the planks required, saying that there were 10,000,000 feet of logs over there and that the long plank

could be sawed just the same as the short ones. Robert Booth, manager of the retail yards, said they had been so busy furnishing shorter lumber for the dredge, etc., that they could not furnish it but that he didn't think there would be any further delays.

Didn't Want Pay.

Last evening when it came to auditing bills, Councilmen Powers and Hennessey who are on the finance committee, scratched off the allowances of \$2 per night made them for attending meetings. They declared that they didn't want to pay for serving but Mayor Straw said that they should be allowed the same as the others. The bills were for the last quarter, Councilmen Nelson and Albrecht being the only ones to draw the full amount, \$36.

City Attorney Snover was instructed to go over the new charter recently submitted by the citizens committee and get it in shape to submit at the election in December.

action of the government authorities. The case has been worked up against him by Steve Connell head of the secret service bureau in this city. Connell was unable to be present at the arrest as he is ill.

"The nature of the evidence against Avery has not yet been made public, but it is said by Mr. Connell to be of such a character as to leave no room for doubt as to his guilt. That other arrests may follow is very likely as men engaged in this nefarious traffic never work singly and the government officers are now following clues leading up to the discovery of the remainder of the gang and the location of its plant. An agent for the government is now in the Coos Bay district collecting evidence and the Portland office may soon be in the possession of some startling information.

"Avery had been under surveillance for some time past. He has been living in North Bend and Marshfield since one year ago last December. He was always employed, his last position being that of foreman for J. J. Burns, a contractor of North Bend, who was engaged in work at Bay Park, a seaside resort nearby. The amount of the spurious coin put into circulation in this section is not known, but it is feared that the counterfeiters have succeeded in getting out hundreds and perhaps thousands of dollars.

"Whether the coins have been made in Oregon, or made in some other state and shipped here, is not now definitely known, but the theory is that they are made in another state. For this reason the Secret Service men are anxious to maintain a certain amount of secrecy about their case until they have more definite information regarding the other members of the gang. The imitation gold pieces are said to so closely resemble the genuine that it would be difficult for the average citizen to detect anything wrong, even after an examination of the counterfeit.

"It was perhaps a significant thing that Avery had \$100 in gold in his pocket at the time of his arrest. The police were unable to find any bad coin, either in his pockets or in a grip he carried. Two trunks which came up with him on the steamer, however, have been seized and are being held for the government officials. They will be searched today.

"According to the theory of the officers, Avery has been selected as one of the gang because of his innocent record. He is said to have lived all his life in Fremont county, Wyo., where his parents now reside. He came from Wyoming to Oregon. Avery is a big, strong fellow, who

stands fully six feet high, and is of powerful build. He declares that he is innocent of the charge and knows nothing whatever of the counterfeit money alleged to have been passed by him. Formal charges will probably be filed against him today."
