HERMANN TO ALSO ATTEND

Former Congressman Coming to Oregon-Idaho Development Congress.

Binger Hermann of Roseburg, former congressman from this district, has announced that he will attend the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress on Coos Bay in August. Gov. Benson has also signified his intention to attend. Mr. Hermann is largely responsible for Coos Bay getting its only federal appropriation for harbor improvement.

Today, the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce sent out a number of personal invitations urging various prominent people to be in attendance. It is practically certain that either Senator Bourne or Senator Chamberlain will be in attendance and probably both Congressmen Ellis and Hawley.

Already plans for entertaining the visitors are being talked. It is suggested that if the weather is favorable, as it undoubtedly will be, that one session be held on the beach in the open air in plain view of the harbor bar, the improvement of which is one of the objects of the congress. As other features of this trip, it is proposed that the Life Saving Crew give a special exhibition or drill and that a big clam bake or crab dinner be arranged.

If the delegates can remain over Sunday, a special excursion to the Coquille valley is proposed. A special train would be chartered and the trip would enable the delegates to get a better idea of this section.
