HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB FOR COOS BAY

THE IMMIGRATION which came to America from foreign countries and landed at Atlantic ports reached the enormous number of one million one hundred thousand in 1908. Of this multitude twenty-five per cent or approximately 260,000 were carried from the Atlantic coast to points west of the Rocky Mountains and the railroads received for this one item of business nearly \$26,000,000. When the Panama canal is finished a large part of this business will be diverted through the Gulf of Mexico, Caribbean Sea and Panama Canal. Cheap water transportation is the cry of modern business and the railroads cannot compete with the canal route. It was probably this view of the situation which caused J. J. Hill to declare that "There never would be another transcontinental road built," meaning, no doubt, that all future railroad building on the Pacific coast will accept the ocean as a base and build to the interior from that.

The coast of America, commencing at Eastport, Maine, and entering through the canal and thence up the Pacific, is soon to become one unbroken national highway. Few realize what that means. We now receive furniture from Grand Rapids, Mich., but probably it would be one-half as costly, for Boston, also a great manufacturer of furniture, to ship by way of the canal to this coast. Grand Rapids may have to be satisfied to supply merely the nearby interior trade. The hardware, cotton and woolen fabrics, shoes and various manufactured goods as well as a large part of our groceries, now reach us across the continent. The canal will bring them at much less expense and the Pacific ports which have interior freight connections, will necessarily increase their importance.

The cities on the Atlantic coast which are greatest are those which get their interior connections directly west. Portland, Maine, has one of the best of harbors but no direct western road. Her rail connections are coastwise or untrue. Therefore she remains small. Boston has the Boston and Albany and the Hoosac Tunnel routes which connect her directly with the interior and the west. New York had the Erie Canal west which early in the nineteenth century directed traffic from the Far West to that city, and made her the metropolis. Now the Erie and New York Central railroads bring her to the western trade. The Pennsylvania railroad running due west from Philadelphia made and makes Philadelphia, Baltimore was boosted to metropolitan size and her harbor made of national importance by a "state aided" railroad—the Baltimore and Ohio. Seattle has the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Milwaukee roads due east to the interior. Her greatness is assured. Portland has the North Bank and Short Line and her harbor is utilized. San Francisco has the Southern Pacific and will have the Santa Fe. San Francisco is a great city. San Diego is getting a Southern Pacific interior connection and must become a city of importance.

East of Coos Bay is a tributary country which excels that of any other western section—better than Portland, San Francisco, Seattle or San Diego. The rich Umpqua and Rogue River Valleys, the vast resources of the slopes of the Cas-

ades, the mines of the mountains, the cattle range and wheat fields of Klamath, the wonderful, productive and rich Harney Valley, the rich Malheur Valley and Southern Idaho are all Coos Bay's tributary country.
