PLAN OTHER CHURCH WORK

Archbishop Christie to Return In October to Super-vise It.

Before leaving here yesterday for Portland, Archbishop Christie had perfected preliminary arrangements for improvements in this parish in addition to launching the new church for North Bend, the parochial school and other work in Marshfield and the improvements at Gardiner. He made arrangements whereby the eight acres which the church owns at Bandon will be divided into lots and sold, the proceeds to be used to build a parochial residence and improve the church. He retains four acres as sites for church institutions. This tract will be placed on the market at once and as soon as sufficient money is derived, the improvements there will be started. With their completion, Archbishop Christie expects to appoint a regular priest at Bandon who will have charge of the work in that section.

Archbishop Christie also hopes to arrange for the erection of a church at Wedderburn within a short time, giving the priest there all of Curry county for his parish. There is a church at Cape Blanco erected by Mr. Hughes, a well-known pioneer of Curry county. Besides this church, Mr. Hughes built a fine chapel at his home and these are the only Catholic edifices in Curry county.

At Cape Blanco, Archbishop Christie administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to Agnes Mary Hughes, Anna Elizabeth Hughes and John Thomas Masterson.

At Gardiner, the following were the members of the confirmation class:

Archbishop Christie expects to return here this fall, probably the latter part of September or early in October to complete the improvements he started on this trip and which he left in the hands of the Rev. Father J. A. Mogan of Marshfield and Rev. Father Curley of North Bend.

MANY TO JOIN NEW COMPANY

Seventeen Sign Roster to Organize Coast Artillery On Bay.

At a meeting of the Young Men's Commercial Club at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce last night, the project to organize a coast artillery company was successfully launched, seventeen being enrolled on the roster. A total of sixty-six is required and G. W. Carleton, H. C. Marvin and Dr. Geo. Dix were named as a special committee to secure the balance of the members. Besides these four, a special copy of the roster was ordered left at the Chamber of Commerce so that any one desiring to join may drop in there and sign.

Talks on the benefits of having a guard company here were made by R. O. Graves, Dr. Geo. Dix, F. K. Gettins, R. A. Mercer, Frank Hall, H. C. Marvin, G. W. Kaufman and others. Many of the speakers had been members of the National Guard at other points and were anxious to see Marshfield secure a company aside from the fact that the organization of a company here will mean the hastening of the fortifying of the harbor.

Frank Hall said that he had been a member of California companies for sometime and while he was a little too old to get into the game again, he had brought his seventeen-year-old son down to join. The latter will be able to join by securing his parents consent which has already been given.

A letter from Adjutant General Finzer to Dr. E. Mingus stating the requirements for joining was read. The age limit is between eighteen and forty-five, although members slightly under eighteen may be admitted by the parents giving their consent.

President J. Albert Matson presided at last night's meeting. Owing to it being a special session, no other business was taken up. G. W. Kaufman said that he would be ready to report at the next regular meeting of the developments in the preparations for entertaining the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress here in August.

M'CANN URGES PAVING HERE

Former Contractor Writes Mayor E. E. Straw Concerning Work.

In view of the fact that some of the property owners of the downtown section have started to remonstrate against the paving of those streets with bituminous rock on the ground that the price for filling is more than Contractor McCann charged last year, the following letter which has just been received by Mayor E. E. Straw from Mr. McCann, who is at Eureka, will be of interest:

"My Dear Straw:—I received a letter from Mr. Whitmore in which he said the property owners there say I promised to make the fills at 25 cents. That is a mistake. I did so last season and we came out about \$300 loser on our venture. Roseburg is paying her streets with a much inferior paving than you have in Marshfield and they pay for all cuts and fills and they are paying thirty cents per foot. Now, Doctor, you folks are getting your work done very reasonable so I hope you all will help Mr. Whitmore as I think you are very fortunate to have a home man to do your work. So do all you can for him and help your own town. I would like very much to see all you folks but I will go up there this fall and I want to be proud of your town and if you go on as you have for the last two years, you will beat Eureka by 1911, sure.

SURVEY ON SIUSLAW.

Raise \$50,000 for Proposed Railway.

EUGENE, Ore., July 20.—Survey for the Eugene-Siuslaw railroad will begin early this week, under the supervision of Dr. H. B. Leonard, head of the department of mathematics at the University of Oregon, and it is expected that actual construction work on the line will begin early in August. Over a third of the \$150,000 in stock subscriptions required before construction work can begin has been raised, and the committees have only fairly begun their work. The promoters of the enterprise, who are all local men, are sanguine of success. It is planned to build only to Franklin, a village 18 miles northwest of Eugene, this fall, and complete the line to Florence at the mouth of the Siuslaw River, next year.
