CAPT. EDWARDS TO GET NEW STERN WHEEL BOAT

"Millicoma" Will Be Ready For North Coos River Run In About Month—Light Draught Steamer Captain C. E. Edwards is having a new stern wheel boat of light draught built for the upper North Coos River run. The new craft will be named "The Millicoma" in honor of the river on which she runs. Captain Edwards says that the right name of the stream known as North Coos River is "The Millicoma" and that the government charts so show it.

The new craft is a stern wheel built with a fifty-five foot hull and eleven-foot beam. It is figured that she can run in between eight and ten inches of water so that she will be able to ply in and out of Allegany regardless of the tide. At first she will be equipped with a gasoline engine and if it proves successful and cheap, gasoline will be retained as the motive power.

When completed, she will take the place of the small boat now plying in and out of Allegany and connecting with the Alert.
