Makes New Record.—E. S. Barzee of North Bend, believes he has the champion early laying pullet. A full blood Brown Leghorn pullet which was hatched on his place April 1, began laying July 18 at the age of three months and eighteen days. He says he never heard of so young a pullet becoming a producer and he would like to know if any other poultry raisers have.

No Action On Mail.—Postmaster W. B. Curtis has not been apprised of any action by the government on the bids which were recently received for carrying the mail to Coos Bay from Drain via Gardiner instead of from Roseburg over the old Coos Bay wagon road.
