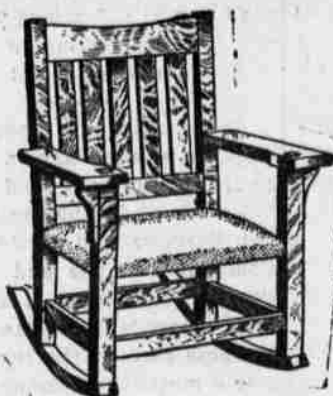

OIL AND COAL
SOON BE GONE

GOVERNMENT EXPERTS SHOW THAT PRESENT KNOWN DEPOSITS WILL NOT LAST COUNTRY MANY YEARS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 24.—The report of the National Conservation Commission of 1908, showing the reckless manner in which our natural resources are being wasted, finds an echo in a bulletin just issued by the United States Geological Survey, in which are reprinted the papers on mineral resources contributed by members of the survey to the conservation report.

Coal is considered first, and it is shown that waste in mining losses forever about one-half as much as is marketed. This half is either left in the ground in thin beds or in the shape of pillars to support the roof. Coal has been extensively mined in the United States for not much more than half a century, but the consumption is increasing so enormously that if this increase should continue all the easily accessible coal would be exhausted by the year 2040 and all coal by the middle of the twenty-first century. It will, of course, not continue at such a rate, for the increasing scarcity will raise prices and check consumption. Water power, too, will undoubtedly largely take its place.

Petroleum and Natural Gas.

With regard to petroleum the situation is a good deal more serious. Petroleum has been used for less than 50 years, and it is estimated that the supply will last only about 25 or 30 years longer. If production is curtailed and waste stopped it may last till the end of the century. The most important effects of its disappearance will be in the lack of lubricants, and in the loss of illuminants. Animal and vegetable oils will not begin to supply its place. This being the case, the reckless exploitation of oil fields and the consumption of oil for fuel should be checked.

In natural gas the waste is enormous; 1,000,000,000 cubic feet are estimated to be wasted into the air every 24 hours. The gas supply will last about 25 years—about as long as it has already been utilized.

HUME ESTATE SALE.

Nothing Doing Before October, Says Port Orford Report.

The Port Orford Tribune says: "We understand that the sale of the Hume property cannot be made until an early date in October. It is an extensive and valuable property, and no doubt there are sharp schemers at work to bear down the price."

"The well-to-do men of Northern Curry and Port Orford ought to call a meeting at Port Orford, and take steps to put in a bid for the Wharf and Cold Storage building at this place. It is not believed that the Cold Storage building will bring much, but it would be very valuable as a warehouse and might be sold for the purpose for which it was built. But the people ought to own the wharf and if they miss this chance to get it, they will pay for it in the future by excessive wharf charges."

THREE BATTLE
WITH A BEAR

COQUILLE MEN HAVE THRILLING ENCOUNTER WITH BRUIN AND LOSE TWO GUNS AND A DOG.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "Glen and Jess Barker, Job Dunham and Fred Johnson had a very exciting time with a large bear on Bolivar Mountain last Saturday which cost the Barker boys one of their most valuable dogs and also cost the bear and her two cubs their lives. The boys had been hunting bear and panther all day without success and had finally given up and were hunting water for a camping place. While coming down a difficult piece of ground on the side of Mt. Bolivar they encountered the bear and her cubs. The bear was in a cul-de-sac in the hills where she could not get out without cleaning out the entire bunch, and she surely gave a good account of herself before the boys and dogs finally killed her."

"She was encountered very suddenly and before the boys could get in a shot she cuffed one of the dogs over the bluff. The boys then opened fire on her, firing at least ten shots into her body during the battle. At no time were they more than a dozen feet from her. During the battle another of the dogs was thrown by a small sapling within reach of the bear and was promptly ripped open and killed. Another of the dogs got his foot into the bear's mouth and was so badly crippled that it was necessary to carry it home."

"Owing to the danger of hitting each other or the dogs the boys were finally compelled to club their guns and beat the bear to death in that way. In the melee two of the guns were broken. After the mother bear was killed the two cubs were shot from the tree up which the mother had boosted them at the beginning of the battle. The boys were so badly disgusted with the outcome of the fight, losing a very valuable dog and breaking two guns, that they did not stop even to cut a claw from the bear. If it had been a panther they say the result would probably have been that they would not have stopped to scalp it."

NEW TRAIL INTO CURRY
COSTS \$1,000 PER MILE

Water Grade Outlet to Grants Pass to Displace Mountain Grade From West Fork.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—"We are now constructing a trail in the Siskiyou mountain range that is the most expensive forest trail the government ever undertook to build," says M. J. Anderson, of the United States Forest Service, located at Grants Pass and in charge of that reserve, who is in the city.

"This trail will give Curry county a water grade outlet to the Southern Pacific at Grants Pass. The present trail from West Fork to Gold Beach attains an altitude of 5,000 feet. The new trail, which is about 25 miles in length, connects with the old trail at Mule Creek by following the Rogue River and avoids the mountains. Some of this trail is costing \$1,000 per mile and about \$2,000 has already been expended. We have built one bridge that has a span of 180 feet between piers."

TAKE MOVING PICTURES.

Southern Pacific to Operate Special Train, With Camera on Pilot

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—Moving pictures taken from the cow-catcher of a locomotive showing the Columbia River scenery of the O. R. & N., and the Cow Creek Canyon, Willamette Valley, Rogue River valley and Umpqua valley scenery of the Southern Pacific will be secured by the passenger department of the Harriman lines.

It is planned to operate a special train over the O. R. & N. between Cello Falls and Portland. A moving picture taking machine will be fastened to the pilot of the locomotive, and the entire run between Cello Falls and Portland will be shown. Three days will be occupied in photographing portions of the Southern Pacific line between Portland and Ashland.

When completed the pictures will be exhibited at the fair in Seattle and will be distributed to scores of points throughout the east for use in advertising Oregon.
