SOME UNUSUAL OREGON LAWS

A List of Little Peculiarities in the State Statutes that Make Interesting Reading.

(Compiled especially for The Coos Bay Times.)

Half A Loaf Is Better Than Whole —It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person in marking domestic animals on the ear, to cut, mark, or remove any part exceeding one-half of the ear. Fine \$5.00 to \$100.00, jail 5 to 50 days.

This Is Good In South Carolina.—Any person posting another, or in writing or print using any reproachful or contemptuous language to or concerning another for not fighting a duel, etc., shall be punished by imprisonment of not less than one year nor more than two years.

Can't They Take the Hint Without Being Told?—Lobbying with members of the Legislature without first disclosing fully and completely your interest or your employer's interest in the bill you wish defeated or passed makes you subject to a fine or imprisonment.

For the Benefit of the New Artillery Company.—It shall be unlawful to use any battery, swivel or pivot gun, or other gun than the one to be held in the hands or fired from the shoulder either from the shore * * * at any time for the purpose of shooting wild ducks, geese, swan or other water fowl.

Catching Them Coming and Going. If any person having committed a crime or attempted to commit a

crime in the dwelling house of another, shall break in the night time any outer door, window shutter or other part of such house, to get out of the same, such person shall be deemed guilty of burglary, etc.

If You Are Going to Rob, Don't First Bluff Your Victim.—If any person not being armed with a dangerous weapon, shall by force and violence or assault, rob, steal or take from the person of another * * * any property which may be the subject of larceny, such person is liable to penitentiary one to five years.

A Mean Trick. It Ought to Be Punished.—Any person assaulting another with a cowhide whip, stick or like thing, having at the time in his possession a pistol, dirk or other deadly weapon with intent to intimidate and prevent such other from defending himself, etc., shall be imprisoned not less than one year nor more than ten years.

Boys, If You Must Smoke, Go to the Hay Mow.—It shall be unlawful for any minor under the age of eighteen years to smoke or in any way use any cigar, cigarette, or tobacco in any form whatsoever in any public street, highway, place, square or resort. Fine not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars, or in jail two days for each offense.

MAIL ORDER BUSINESS PROBLEM DISCUSSED

Editor Times:

I have been eagerly watching your columns for an explanation of my question regarding the mail order business and have as yet not seen anything outside a meager attempt at securing a little personal advertisement. Personally, I have not been disappointed, because when I said people could buy cheaper from the mail order house, I felt confident that I could prove the assertion so I enclose a letter received sometime ago which is only one of a number on the same strain:

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 16, '09. The Riebe Wholesale Co., Marshfield, Oregon.

Gentlemen:

One of your lists has been sent to us by a customer in Marshfield who complains that your price on our Tea Garden Drips is lower than the average price sold by the Marshfield merchants, and that it is interfering with their profit. Of course, you will realize that when a brand of goods is cut it injures the manufacturer as it immediately becomes unpopular unless the merchants have made a reasonable margin of profit. We are, of course, glad to have you handle Tea Garden, but we are going to ask you to place it on the same basis as the other merchants. This will result in more profit to you and will surely be a help to us, and on this basis, if you wish to have it, we will give you all the help we can to sell it. It is our desire to cooperate with the dealers and protect them and in this way hope to make our goods a mutual benefit.

We will be glad to know if you will assist us.

In explanation to the above letter I beg to say that in compiling the list referred to, I simply took prices from a catalogue which advertised the goods at 85c per can but through a typographical error it was only 83c in my list. Now the regular wholesale list is \$8.76 per case of twelve cans or exactly 73 cents per can which if sold for 85c would be 12c profit or a little over 14 per cent which we considered sufficient provided the transactions were on the same terms as the mail order house.

Now, regarding the local combination of the merchants, the writer was the instigator and agitator for an organization for the benefit of the people in general, the object being to establish a system of credit whereby those who paid for what they got

would not have to pay for some one who never intends to pay.

When a person is credited with goods it is the same as money. Now the banks do not lend out promiscuously should any one go there and say give me \$20 and I will bring a check which is coming to me next pay day, it would not be reasonable to think the cashier would fall over himself in an effort to hand out the coin, but the same person would be quite indignant should the grocery man hesitate to send by special delivery an equal value of absolute necessities. In returning to the matter of the association the original intention seems to be greatly perverted instead of credits it has drifted in to prices which the manufacture and wholesale houses have set on their goods thereby by using the merchants as a tool or slot machine to dispense their goods they set the cost and also the selling price, the local retailer fills a place in the community which the mail order house can never do provided he is alive and wide-awake. The reason the mail order houses have succeeded is because they have been independent even going so far as to own their factories, thereby ignoring the jobber altogether.

Now, Mr. Editor, I think after proper consideration you can readily see that the fault lies not with the people but with the merchants themselves.
