The Busy People

MADE RICH BY GIRL'S GOLD FIND

Immense Wealth In Sight For Entire Family of Nevada Miner.

LONACONING, Md., July 26. — Edward Clifford, Sr., formerly a coal miner of Charlestown, near here, who left Lonaconing for the west about thirty years ago, so poor that he was compelled to walk part of the way to the gold fields of Nevada, leaving his wife and two children behind in Lonaconing with relatives, has struck it rich by his daughter, Ellen, now Mrs. Joseph Ney, finding a ledge of gold-bearing quartz, estimated to be worth \$100,000 a ton, on which property, the entire family, now consisting of father, mother and nine sons and daughters, have staked and registered claims that are expected to make millionaires of all of them.

After Clifford had worked in the west with varying success for two years he was able to send for his wife and children, and the little family grew as his savings from work also grew. His daughter, Ellen, showed an aptitude almost from childhood for prospecting, and through the teachings of her father gained an intimate knowledge of the minerals and mineral deposits of Nevada. When she grew to womanhood she married Joseph Ney, a young prospector, and often went on prospecting trips with him.

On one of these recent trips, while searching through a gulch near where she and her husband were camping for the day, she saw a ledge that gave promise of something valuable, and going up to it, she broke off a piece, which showed that they had at last struck it rich. Quietly they drove home with the gold-bearing piece of rock, and the matter was kept a family secret until twenty-five claims had been staked out and the question of ownership settled.

The gold-bearing ledge is full fifty feet long, wedge-shaped, thickening as it goes into the hillside. If the ore shoot at that point maintains its thickness for fifty feet, the family undoubtedly will become multi-millionaires.

Two years ago Mr. and Mrs. Clifford visited their relatives in Lonaconing, and in this vicinity Mrs. Clifford has four sisters and one brother living.
