Mundy and the rest of his party who will probably return with him. Mr. Andrews has not yet secured leases on the amount of land required before they can begin drilling.

Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet tonight. The principal business to come up will be ordering of street improvements. The South Marshfield sewage system may also be brought up for discussion. J. M. Blake will also present a report on his efforts to secure the consent of property owners for a street-car system.

The berries are a special variety that Mr. Scott has secured by crossing the Fox Seedling of Hood River fame and the Magoon and he has called it "Scott's Prolific." Some of the berries have attained a size of over six inches in circumference.
