

## WRITES ABOUT FAIR EXHIBIT

J. W. Ward Tells of Coos County's Exhibit at Seattle.

Henry Sengstacken has received the following self-explanatory letter from J. A. Ward who with Mr. Hurd has charge of the Coos County Exhibit at Seattle:

Dear Sir: Yours of the 16th is at hand and contents noted. The photo of Marshfield will likely arrive in a day or two and we have a good place reserved for it—the two will be mounted back to back in the central part of the room where it is open on both sides.

In regard to our exhibit, the facts are as follows: We were here nearly three weeks before anything arrived for the Coos county exhibit except some myrtle furniture from Coquille and the taxidermist's specimens, the latter not coming till nearly that time. When these specimens arrived the commissioners stored them in the basement, as they said, until they could arrange suitable room for them as the exhibit space was already crowded. They also objected to the Elk as not being presentable—not properly mounted. To a great extent that is true. Our taxidermist down there, Mr. Graham, is wholly to blame for that. When Mr. Hurd and I saw him and selected the articles to be sent, we did not tell him to send the elk because at that time it was not in good shape. He said he intended to do considerable work on it yet. But it came here with awkward crooks in the legs and disproportions which really render it unfit to put up along with the other fine specimens exhibited here by the Baker Bros. of Portland. Aside from this real objection, there seems to have been some political influences at work. The Portland man had the pull and got all the space he wanted for his specimens before any one else was considered. The commissioners kept delaying about getting our stuff out of the basement until last week we told them they must either put it on exhibition or ship it back at once. Consequently the specimens are all in fine locations now, each piece bearing a card "From Coos County," in large print and it all looks fine except the elk and it looks fairly well. The coal is in place well carded and accompanied by one of Coos Bay Folios showing our coal field. The shell fish are well located, each can bears its proper label furnished by the North Bend Chamber of Commerce and accompanied by the cards "From Coos County."

The photographs are attractive also. But the Myrtle exhibit simply takes the people clear off their feet. They simply rave and exclaim. Nothing else on the grounds will compare with it. We have the crowd captured in the Oregon building all the time.

This morning the printed matter came and we put it out in five locations on the main floor and had to replenish each pile several times—people seemed anxious for it. Personally I am giving my time almost wholly with the Coos county exhibit and talking Coos county. We are getting better advertising than any other part of the state.

One thing we ought to have is a good map of Coos county about 2x3 feet to hang up. Of course I am using the one in the folio but should have a good wall map if there is one available. We could also make a good display of cheese if we had it now. There is space right between our coal and the fine butter exhibit of Hazelwood which is in a glass refrigerator.

It is not necessary to send any more wood products, we are O. K. on that score. Later if fruit or vegetables can be delivered here in good condition, we will find a place for them.

Aside from the taxidermy specimens, there has been no delay in getting things in place and properly displayed although we have been at a disadvantage all the time by being late getting on the ground. People who were here during June, of course, did not see much from Coos, but those who come now are finding plenty to be proud of.

The fair is a great success and is improving every day. We have seen several Coos county people lately and hope to see many more.

When the umpire called "foul," McPherson turned purple, gave a yell like a maniac and rolled from the top row of the bleachers' stand head first to the ground writhing. There was great confusion and excitement among the spectators. A physician at the game took McPherson in charge and had him rushed to the hospital.

Allentown players said that McPherson has been following the team all over the circuit.

If your yards and streets are not placed in a cleanly condition within ten days from the publication of this notice, I shall institute such proceedings against you as by the said ordinance provided.
