

ALPHONSO DECLARES MARTIAL LAW THROUGHOUT SPAIN TODAY

Revolution of Subjects Against
Moroccan War Becomes
Serious.

BARCELONA IS IN
CONTROL OF MOBS

Fighting Continues In Africa
and Outlook Is Gloomy
One.

BULLETIN.

MADRID, July 28.—King
Alfonso today issued a decree
proclaiming martial law and the
suspension of the constitutional
guarantees throughout Spain.

HENDAYE, France, July 28.
—King Alfonso of Spain, to-
day hurriedly left on the San
Sebastian for Madrid. It is ru-
mored that the ministry will
resign in favor of a military
cabinet as the movement at
Barcelona is regarded clearly
as revolutionary.

MADRID, July 28.—The latest of-
ficial reports from Barcelona indicate
that the city is almost completely at
the mercy of the mob. Two noto-
rious anarchists are reported to be
the leaders of the rioting which is ac-
companied by incendiarism and de-
struction of property. The convent
of Maristas was taken by assault and
the church of St. Paul and the con-
gregational schools of St. Antonio
were burned. Bands of strikers have
been despatched to the surrounding
country to destroy all railroad ap-
proaches to Barcelona and thus pre-
vent the arrival of any more troops.

PAPERS ARE SUPPRESSED.

Barcelona Is Now Without Any Pub-
lic Prints.

BARCELONA, July 28.—Troops
have arrived to reinforce the garri-
son here. No newspapers were pub-
lished today. The House of the
People, the headquarters for the
rioters, was closed today by the
military authorities.

PUBLIC WORK TO GO AHEAD

Council Decides to Rush Sew-
age System and Paving
Here.

The final action preliminary to
asking for bids was taken by the
Marshfield city council last evening
on the South Marshfield sewage sys-
tem and the paving in the "saw dust"
flat district. The council decided that
the projects should be hastened as
much as possible to permit their
completion before the rainy season.

Peter Scott and George Baines en-
tered a protest against the construc-
tion of the sewage system, claiming
they would be assessed about \$700
apiece for the Golden avenue section
which they declared would not bene-
fit their property as they have no
buildings on it that could be con-
nected up with the sewer. The
Southern Pacific and a few others
had also signed the remonstrance but
the Southern Pacific informed Coun-
cilmann Powers to withdraw its re-
monstrance, claiming its protest had
been secured through misrepresentations.

After pointing out to Messrs. Scott
and Baines that the only way that the
larger part of Southwest Marshfield
could be sewered was by building the
sewerage system down along their prop-
erty, the council voted unanimously
to go ahead with the project.

The sewer system will run as fol-
lows:

Flanagan avenue, Eleventh street
South, Tenth street South, Seventh
street South Golden avenue West,
alley between Second and Fourth
streets South, Ninth street South,
Eighth street South, Elrod avenue,
Sixth street South, Donnelly avenue
West, Fourth street South, Curtis
avenue, Center of alley in blocks 27
and 28 in Railroad addition and Cen-
ter of alley in blocks 24, 25 and 26,
Railroad addition.

Want Paving Delayed.

Alva Doll, I. S. Kaufman and
others presented a protest against
the paving of Anderson avenue west
from Broadway with bituminous rock
paving this fall, claiming that the
fill was too soft to sustain it. They
said that next year they wanted it
paved with bituminous rock. They
are opposed to having it planked this
fall. Action on the matter was post-
poned a week to permit the council
and city engineer to inspect the fill
and see whether it would support the
paving.

Other Business.

Flanagan street property owners
were given permission to place all of
the dirt to be removed off that street
between Tenth and Eleventh to any
point they desired providing about
500 yards were placed at low place
on the street under supervision of the
city engineer.

The grade of Market avenue from
Broadway to Fourth streets was or-
dered reestablished and also the
grade of Elrod avenue from Broad-
way to Twelfth street.

The Southern Pacific has given
consent for a right of way across its
property from Broadway to the Bay
for the new sewage system.

The property on North Broadway
and North Cedar street on which the
assessments for street improvements
have not been paid, was ordered sold.

Arrangements are to be made so
that the contractors of the new sew-
age system and the street paving can
secure the special improvement
bonds that are issued on the streets
just as soon as the work is done.
Some of the contractors have ar-
ranged for the sale of some of these
bonds.

The finance committee was in-
structed to readvertise the special
improvement bonds now on hand so
that parties desiring them can se-
cure them. The first payment on

HYDE'S SECRETARY IS A SUICIDE

Former Confidential Represen-
tative of Life Insurance Man
Kills Himself On Isolated
Washington Ranch.

EVERETT, Wash., July 28.—
John H. Stuart, said to have been
confidential secretary to James Hazen
Hyde when the latter was vice-presi-
dent of the Equitable Life Assurance
Society of New York, committed sui-
cide a short distance from his cabin
near Mukilto yesterday by shooting
himself in the body and head. Ac-

cording to a deputy coroner who in-
vestigated the suicide, Stuart was a
witness against Hyde in the inves-
tigation that resulted in the latter
losing control of the great assurance
company. Stuart afterwards suffered
losses on Wall Street, came west
and built a poor two-room cabin in
the forest near Mukilto and lived a
hermit's life until his wife, said to
be the daughter of a railroad official
of New York, joined him last Feb-
ruary. Stuart lived as a logger and
rancher, telling no one of his former
connections in New York. He left his
cabin yesterday and went to a spot
a quarter of a mile away and shot
himself.

WON'T ACCEPT ANY SALARY

Messrs. Powers and Hennessey
Insist On Serving
Without Pay.

Councilmen A. H. Powers and
Patrick Hennessey last evening in-
sisted on returning their salary war-
rants to the city, declaring that they
did not want any remuneration for
their services, feeling that they were
amply paid if they could accomplish
anything for the public good. They
objected when the salary bills were
brought up a few weeks ago, but they
were allowed \$2 apiece for each
meeting they attended or \$16 apiece
for the time they had served. War-
rants were drawn for these amounts
and just how to have the money re-
turned to the city is the problem that
the council was unable to solve last
night. Some suggested that they
cash the warrants and give the money
to the city recorder to be used
for charity but Messrs. Powers and
Hennessey insisted that it revert di-
rect to the city.

The warrants will remain un-
cashed until they can be cancelled
at some later meeting or the matter
disposed of some other way.

To Impose Fines.

Councilman Nelson is again in-
sisting that the denizens of the Marsh-
field "red light" district be fined regu-
larly. He says that each of the four
resorts should be required to pay
at least \$15 or \$25 per month to the
city. Just how to collect it has not
been determined but it is likely
that at the next meeting of the
council, arrangements will be made
to indirectly license the vice.

Care For Millers.

Chairman Coke of the Health
Committee reported that the mem-
bers of the Miller family on South
Broadway near Mill Slough, who
have been quarantined, will soon be
recovered. Mrs. Miller has devel-
oped other complications and their
little baby is ailing, the latter how-
ever, is not ill of the small pox.
Owing to the fact that the only care
the couple receive is from a young
daughter, it was decided that the
city hire a nurse for the family until
the smallpox quarantine can be re-
moved.

Wife of Capt. A. M. Simpson
Succumbs to Linger-
ing Illness.

Mrs. A. M. Simpson died yesterday
afternoon about 4 o'clock at St.
Helena Sanitarium near San Fran-
cisco after a lingering illness. She
had been in critical condition for sev-
eral weeks and the end was not un-
expected.

Although she never made her home
on Coos Bay, Mrs. Simpson was well-
known to the older residents of this
section through frequent visits with
her husband at North Bend when he
spent a large share of his time there.
Her last visit to Coos Bay was about
two years ago.

Mrs. Simpson was about sixty-one
years old. Her maiden name was
Sophia D. Smith and she married
Capt. A. M. Simpson at Racine, Wis.,
in 1875.

Besides her husband, she is sur-
vived by four children, L. J. Simpson
and Edgar Simpson of North Bend;
Dr. Harry Simpson who has been
studying medicine in Chicago, and
Miss Edith Simpson who has remain-
ed at home with her parents.

Edgar Simpson and Mrs. L. J.
Simpson left on the M. F. Plant to-
day for San Francisco. The funeral
will be held there. Mrs. Simpson
was a member of St. Luke's Episcopal
church in San Francisco.

BANK'S LOSS GROWS.

IS AFRAID OF BEING POISONED

Mrs. A. H. Ames of North
Bend Makes Serious Charge
—Investigation Begun.

Mrs. A. H. Ames of North Bend,
who is said to have been making
serious allegations against various
ones, was taken before Judge John
F. Hall and Dr. R. E. Golden, acting
as the commissioners of insanity, last
evening but after an examination,
she was pronounced sane. No one pre-
ferred charges against her and after
investigating the case, Dr. Golden
declared that it was a case for "crim-
inal investigation."

The Times has received letters
from Mrs. Ames in which she charged
that an effort was being made to
poison her. It is presumed that as
a result of yesterday's investigation,
Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist at
Coquille will investigate the charges
made by her.

Mrs. Ames has been a resident of
Coos Bay for a number of years and
Mr. Ames is employed at the North
Bend Box factory. Several years
ago, Mrs. Ames was the victim of a
sensational attack made on her by
an employee of a steamship running
from San Francisco to Coos Bay.

Reported Action of Conference
Committee On Revision
Bill.

TAFT INSISTS ON
DOWNWARD REVISION

Said to Have Declared That He
Won't Stand For More
Than \$1.25 On Lumber.

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 28.—
Congressional visitors at the White
House today reported that President
Taft is not satisfied with the prospect
of the supposed agreement of the
Senate and House tariff conferees as
announced last night. Taft is said
to have expressed himself in em-
phatic terms regarding lumber and
to have declared that he would in-
sist that the rate on lumber shall not
go over \$1.25 per thousand.

That hides have been traded for
lumber in the preparation of the re-
port of the tariff bill was reiterated
about the capitol today in connection
with the report that tariff conferees
had agreed to the retention of the
Senate rate of \$1.50 per thousand on
rough lumber.

Senators Nelson and Clapp and
Representative Tawney and others
are quite incensed over the change
that has been made and many asser-
tions were heard that no report for a
higher rate on lumber than the House
had fixed could be adopted by the
House. It was believed to be different
in the Senate. The low lumber men in
the Senate generally had been among the
insurgents who had voted against the
bill originally and they were hopeless of
preventing the adoption of the con-
ference report in that body. This
state of mind was largely due to the
fact that they didn't believe the hide
men would stand with them in opposi-
tion to the report.

Counting nine insurgents who
would vote against the conference
report on general principles and
whose opposition has been intensified
by the decision in favor of a higher
lumber tariff, the hide men said
they would have eighteen republican
votes against the conference report in
favor of free hides.

The free hide opponents say, their
only hope is in the House and the
low lumber men there profess them-
selves willing to accept the responsi-
bility for defeating the bill if the
\$1.50 rate on lumber stands.

They do not, however, believe it
will stand.

The low lumber advocates assert
that when the president assented to
the higher rate on lumber, he was
not in possession of all the facts.
Since the conference of last night he
knows better, say some of them.

JEFF POSTS \$5,000 TODAY
