FOUR PHONE LINES FROM HERE TO ROSEBURG

New Metallic Long Distance Service to Be Put In at Once—Better Service.

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 30.—A construction crew has started out from Roseburg to begin the placing of a double metallic telephone circuit between this city and Coos Bay. This new system, which is being put in by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, will consist of four copper wires, making two complete metallic circuits over the entire distance. This will in no way interfere with the present grounded circuit. This will in reality, afford four circuits between here and Coos Bay, instead of only one as at present, and will assure high class service. It also indicates a decided increase of business between here and points in Coos and Curry counties, which are served by these lines. The new wires will follow the present route, via Brockway, Olalla, Camas Valley and Myrtle Point and are expected to be put in place within the next few weeks. Supplies for building this metallic line have been arriving here for some time.

An order has been made for replacing all the telephone poles in the city, up to the new curb lines and the whole system is to be largely rebuilt. As soon as new office headquarters can be secured the automatic bell system is to be installed, doing away with the present antiquated system for calling central by the old hand bells.
