It is imperative that each and every one residing within the limits of the said City of Marshfield, shall at once take such steps as may be necessary to comply with the letter and spirit of that part of Ordinance No. 291 above quoted.

You are further notified that I shall suffer no delay on the part of any one in this matter. If your yards and streets are not placed in a cleanly condition within ten days from the publication of this notice, I shall institute such proceedings against you as by the said ordinance provided. Give this matter your careful attention.
