HOW CITIES ARE MADE.

COOS BAY PEOPLE CAN find much encouragement and suggestion in the study of the development of other successful cities. In every instance it requires push, pluck and perseverance to accomplish anything in city building.

The growth of Boise, Idaho, is an exemplification of what persistent enterprise will do in the upbuilding of a city.

In this instance the mossback proclivities of those who refused to raise a moderate sized bonus, lost them the main line of the Oregon Short Line railroad, and for several years they were without railroad facilities at all.

Then a 20-mile stub road was built connecting with the main line, which was and is still their only steam railway.

The town was surrounded for hundreds of miles by sage brush deserts, and had but one commercial advantage to build its future upon that of being the capital of a new and sparsely settled state.

But the people there had learned their lesson from the loss of the Oregon Short Line through lack of the proper public spirit, says an exchange.

They determined to overcome all obstacles and build up a city.

How well they have succeeded is demonstrated by the fact that the town, which had a population of less than 6000 when the federal census of 1900 was taken, is now a beautiful city of 25,000 people, with one million dollars worth of buildings under construction this year, including a seven-story hotel which will be one of the finest in the Northwest.

Boise owes nearly all of its growth and prosperity to the enterprise of its people.

They not only erected fine homes and business buildings, paved streets and laid cement sidewalks, but they built electric roads through the irrigated valleys to the towns on the Short Line, and thus extended the area of their retail trade.

Local capital built one of these roads, 20 miles long, without the assistance of a dollar of outside money and local men began and promoted another 30 miles in length.

It was this faith in their city and willingness to back its enterprises financially which made Boise the city it is today and overcame the many obstacles that would have discouraged less determined communities.

WANTS LOCAL MEN IN RACE

Walter Lyon Says Coos and Curry Will Have Candidates For Office.

The Portland Oregonian prints the following which will be news to every one in this section including the men whose names are mentioned:

"When the time arrives for selecting candidates for the various state offices next year, the voters of Coos and Curry counties, and they are almost unanimously Republican, are planning to demand recognition and secure a place on the state ticket. According to Walter Lyon of Marshfield, who is at the Imperial, the people of Southwestern Oregon are proposing the names of three men for as many of the principal state offices. They would have Dr. T. J. McCormac nominated for governor, Ira S. Smith for secretary of State, and Edward Bailey, county judge of Curry county, for State treasurer.

"Our section of the state has never been recognized in the selection of state officers," said Mr. Lyon last night. "Geographically and industrially viewed, a place on the next state ticket is due that part of the state. Into Southwestern Oregon is crowded the greater portion of the timber wealth of Oregon. The only active coal mines in the state are in operation there. The greatest unharnessed water power in the state belongs to Southwestern Oregon. The mineral deposits of Coos, Curry and Josephine counties are attracting attention. The agricultural, horticultural, dairying and stock-raising possibilities are being developed and yet that wide stretch of country, bursting with resources, has so far been overlooked in the makeup of state tickets.

"It cannot be charged to a lack of suitable material that no citizen of Southwestern Oregon has ever been honored with a state office. One would have to look a long time to find a man better fitted for the office of governor than Dr. McCormac. In him is combined the spirit of the pioneer and the enthusiasm of the newcomer, which blends into the ideal citizenship. He possesses executive ability, keenness, probity and the courage to say 'no.' For 33 years he has been a citizen of Southwestern Oregon and has been identified with every public enterprise that has come up during that time. At the present time he is president of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce and would make an ideal 'booster' candidate.

"Mr. Smith possesses all of the qualifications required for an efficient secretary of State. He has clerical ability and administrative force and his integrity is beyond question. He has been Sheriff and has served his county in the State Legislature. It would be necessary to rake the state with a fine-toothed comb to find one in whose hands the state's accounts would be safer.

"For treasurer, Southwestern Oregon has Edward Bailey, County Judge of Curry county. Judge Bailey is a young Irishman who does not realize that he is anything more than a country eld-hopper, but, as probate judge, he is handling the R. Hume estate and other large affairs with absolute impartiality toward all concerned and with all the attention to detail that could be expected of the most learned judge. The confidence of the people of Curry county in Judge Bailey is such that, as a candidate to succeed himself, he received all but six votes cast in his county at the last election. With his qualities known, the county judge of Southwestern Oregon's county would prove a sure vote-getter on the state ticket for his party.

"There are other good men in Southwestern Oregon that would grace a state office, but that section does not expect to be called upon to supply the personnel of the entire ticket nor to make demands further than to suggest to those who have to do with making up state tickets that they should bear in mind Coos and Curry counties are on the map of Oregon."
