Build Sidewalk.—D. L. Rood and F. P. Norton are putting in a fine cement sidewalk along their property west from Second street and crossing Third street. The improvement will be of great advantage besides greatly improving the appearance of that section.

Run Dredge Nights.—It is expected that a night shift will be put on the dredge Oregon within a few days from now until the present project is completed. Whether this will mean that the dredge will be moved from Coos Bay will probably remain indefinite until the time comes.

Sail Wednesday.—The Nann Smith will sail Wednesday for San Pedro with one of the largest cargoes she has ever taken out. It is expected that she will carry at

least 2,000,000 feet. When she is loaded so heavily, the loading is slower work, the lumber having to be carefully put in and no room wasted.

Mr. Rau was formerly with the Coos Bay Liquor Company and the friends that he and Mrs. Rau made here will wish them success.

Lund resulted in a charivari party being organized at Eastside last night and for a couple of hours, the noise makers kept busy.
