Mrs. Horsfall Honored.—Mrs. Wm. Horsfall Jr., has had a high honor conferred upon her in being appointed at the last annual convention of the National Federation of Music Clubs as director of the association for Oregon. The honor came

HOGS SHIPPED TO PORTLAND
