CONGRESS AND GOOD ROADS

sections of the county that lead a difference of opinion but that an inspection of the two highways would show that the Myrtle Point wagon road was the most feasible route. As to the bias between sections, he said that should be overlooked as the Coos Bay and Coquille Valley are so interlinked that growth and development in one means that the other must share in its prosperity. He said that at present, \$1,000 properly expended would reduce the auto time between Roseburg and Myrtle Point an hour and make the trip a much easier and nicer one.

J. Albert Matson, who recently made a trip over the same route approved of Mr. Blake's remarks. He said that unquestionably the Myrtle Point road is more feasible for quick transit than the Coos Bay wagon road. He said that he would like to see the county center its energies on the Myrtle Point road and at the next election have the voters of the county vote a bond issue of \$150,000 or thereabouts so that a fine road could be built to Roseburg. He said that the Douglas county officials were partial to the Myrtle Point road as against the Coos Bay wagon road. A good road expert, he said, could easily have a highway built that would be passable throughout the year.

For Coos Bay Wagon Road.

J. D. Goss made a strong argument in behalf of the Coos Bay wagon road by declaring that the residents along the Coos Bay wagon road are taxing themselves ten mills annually and expending at the rate

of about \$21,000 per year to improve their highway while the residents along the Myrtle Point road are not spending a cent, or at any rate only a few hundred dollars a year for the entire distance. He said that it might be that the Myrtle Point road was naturally the better of the two, but as the residents along the route aren't doing anything to improve it, the Coos Bay wagon road residents are the ones entitled to the aid of others. The old saying that "God helps those who help themselves," Mr. Goss declared to be true in this case as the county is putting up dollar for dollar with the residents of the Coos Bay wagon road in improving that highway. Mr. Goss said that the people of the county would not vote a general bond issue to fix any one road now. He said that he would like to see all the roads improved but that he believed that before much can be done on the Myrtle Point road, the residents along it must first show a willingness to help by spending some of their own money on it.

Mr. Goss said that a big step in the progress that the Coos county commissioners are showing in the good roads movement will be the consummation of their plan to hire an expert highway engineer to supervise road building and improvement in the county. He said that the commissioners are now figuring on hiring one for next year and that the action will mean a systematic improvement and also that the county will get more for the money expended on public highways than it will ever be able to realize in any other way.

C. J. Mills, general manager of the Coos Bay, Roseburg and Eastern said he approved most heartily of the good roads movement. He said that he would do everything he could to assist it. He said that something should be done quickly, that better roads mean more traffic and that instead of interfering with a railroad, they will help.

President Matson requested that the good roads committee appointed sometime ago, consisting of Messrs. Feeney, Goss and Graves continue their efforts and report later. He suggested that they make a trip over the Coos Bay wagon road and the Myrtle Point road and determine which is the best.

Suomi picnic at Enegren's Grove last Sunday. All enjoyed the day.

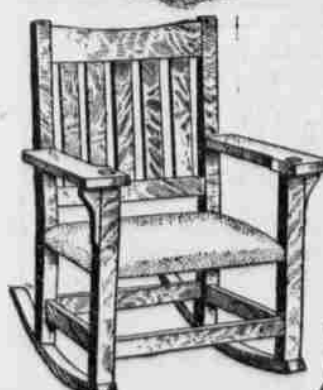
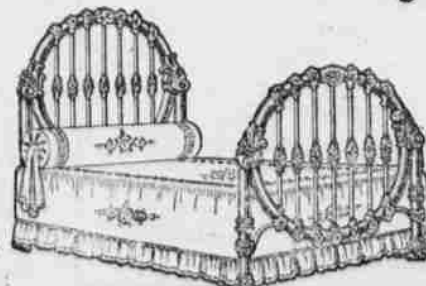
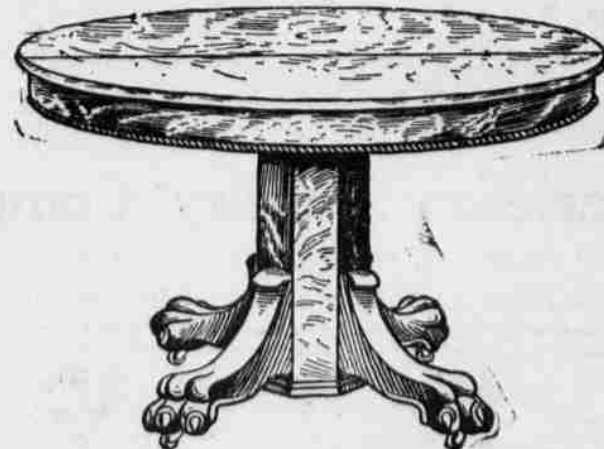
